

HELP FOR PARENTS - UNDERSTANDING AND PREVENTING CHILD ABUSE

FROM THE ST. JAMES PARENT SUPPORT ADVISORY TEAM (PSAT)



CHILD ABUSE IS ANYTHING A PERSON DOES WHICH CAUSES PHYSICAL OR MENTAL HURT TO A CHILD. CHILD ABUSE INCLUDES NEGLECT, WHEN A CHILD IS LEFT ALONE WITHOUT SUPPORT OR SUPERVISION.

There are four main types of child abuse:

1. **Physical Abuse** - When a child suffers pain or injury as a result of physical violence such as beatings, kicking, slapping, pinching, burning etc.
2. **Emotional Abuse** - When a child suffers emotionally because he or she is told negative things about himself or herself ("You worthless like your father"; "You ugly and fool-fool").
3. **Mental Abuse** - When a child's fears and feelings are used by another to force him or her to do what that person wants.
4. **Sexual Abuse and Molestation** - When older persons touch a child in a sexual manner or have sex with a child.

As a parent, ensure that children, who often cannot protect themselves, are protected from all types of abuse.



DO

1. Correct your child without beating or physical punishment.
2. Listen to your child if he or she complains about abuse.
3. Teach children about protection from sexual abuse.



DON'T

1. Ignore child abuse. You can report it to the police or Child Development Agency.
2. Ignore children who complain about abuse. Check out their situation.
3. Leave your children without supervision for long periods.
