

BUILDING A WORLD FIT FOR CHILDREN

A video report on the 2002 UN Special Session on Children and the Children's Forum

“Fight Poverty! Invest in Children!” The small child shouting out from the podium is just one of the many remarkable children who helped shape a history-making event in New York, May 2002. More than 60 world leaders – and several hundred children – gathered for the first ever UN Special Session on Children. The result – a set of ambitious time-bound goals for children on child health, HIV/AIDS, child protection and education. The sheer dynamism and intelligence of the young delegates come to the fore in this eight-minute video that captures the colour and vibrancy of this unique gathering. Above all the video raises important questions and calls world leaders to account on their new commitments to the future of children everywhere.

A further, unnarrated 30-minute compilation of important events during the week of the Special Session is also included.

I saw people shooting. I saw people being killed. I saw people dying. People as young as I was were dying. On two occasions, I saw a man being killed because of his tribe. Another man was slaughtered right in front of our family. I could not stand the sight and hid in my mother’s arms. I saw schools and buildings destroyed. I saw families like mine, in the thousands, leave everything behind and run. I was later told that a war was going on. That was eleven years ago when the war had just begun.”
