## STORYLINE:

The Progress for Children report reviews the goals that the world's nations have set for universal education by 2015.

UNICEF Executive Director Carol Bellamy says significant progress has been made.

"Eighty six percent of primary school children are in school in 2005 and that's up from 82 percent in 2001."

Getting the same number of girls as boys into school by 2005 is the key to meeting the 2015 target set down in the Millennium Development Goals.

About 125 of the 180 nations surveyed are on track to reach gender parity this year. But there are areas such as West, Central and North Africa along with South Asia and the Middle East that will not.

But even though the gender gap has been steadily closing since 1980 and more children than ever are going to school, the rate of improvement is not sufficient.
