Two years after Niger's severe food and nutrition crisis, the sight of undernourished children may be less common here,

Nonetheless chronic malnutrition still affects nearly half of the country's young children in part because of annual food shortages.

At this UNICEF-supported health center, malnourished children are fed with an easy to use therapeutic food called Plumpy'nut.

This factory near Niamey is the only one in West Africa to produce the high-protein-high energy peanut-based food: up to 40 tons a month.

Thanks to the financial support of ECHO, the European Commission's Humanitarian Office, last year UNICEF purchased about 130 tons of the Plumpy'nut produced here.

Plumpy'nut helped treat more than 63,000 severely malnourished children last year. The vitamin-rich food can reach many children since
