Situation of displaced people in Lake region in numbers



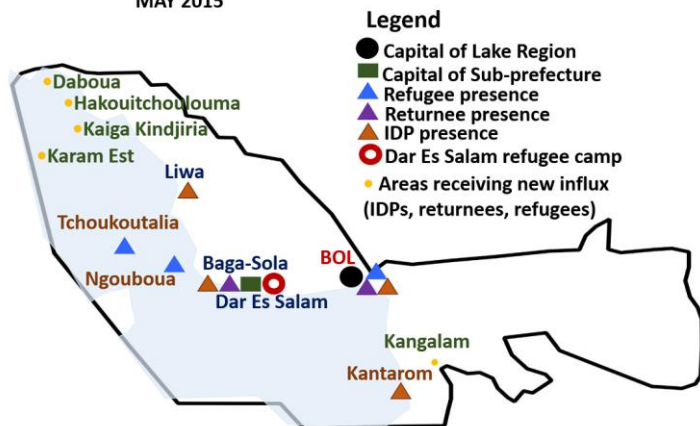

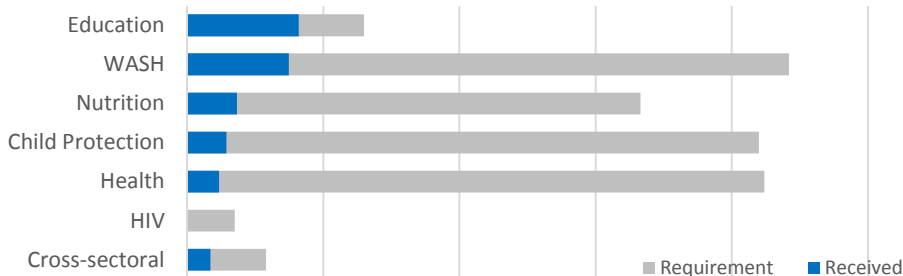

HUMAN RESOURCES: SCALING UP UNICEF'S PRESENCE IN THE FIELD

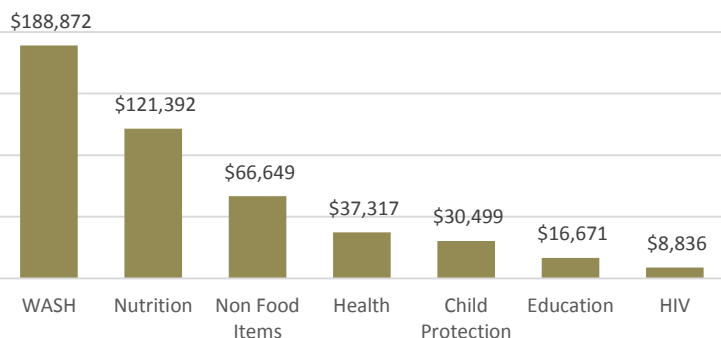
- Since January 2015 UNICEF has maintained a multi-sectoral presence in Bagasola. Eight staff on the ground include WASH, Health and Nutrition, Child Protection, Education, Polio, C4D, and Emergency Coordination.
- UNICEF staff systematically participate in rapid assessments, distribution missions and coordination meetings on the ground.

Field level Coordination by Government and partners :

- Monthly global coordination meetings are organized by the Governor of Lake region in Bol with OCHA support
- Bi-monthly inter-sector coordination meetings are ongoing in Bagasola chaired by local authorities
- Actors of 5 sectors meet weekly in Bagasola to coordinate the humanitarian response
- In N'Djamena, weekly Taskforce meetings meet with OCHA leadership to share information



SUPPLIES: OVER US\$ 470,000 DISTRIBUTED IN THE LAST MONTH



- This past month, a total of US\$ 470,336 of supplies were dispatched to the Lake Region to respond to new waves of displacement from the Niger border.
- 5 additional metric tons of Ready to Use Therapeutic Food (RUTF) and 20 cartons of therapeutic milk were provided to nutrition units to cover needs of refugees, IDPs and returnees in Bagasola and Bol.

UNICEF response highlights in the past month

UNICEF joined a UNDSS security assessment mission from May 14-21 in the new displacement areas in Daboua sub-prefecture (Hakouitchoulouma, Karam, Kaiga, Kindjira) and Kangalam to produce a needs assessment for rapid response.

Health

- 35,007 children under five were vaccinated against polio in Bagasola health district. 33,130 received Vitamin A supplementation and 32,290 received deworming, including refugees in Dar es Salam.
- 481 new SAM cases were admitted and treated in UNICEF supported nutrition units in health centers and hospitals in Bagasola and Bol health districts, bringing the total since the beginning of the response in January 2015 to 1,417 admissions.
- At the Bagasola transit site, rapid screening found 17% global acute malnutrition detected among new arrivals, including 9 cases of SAM and 11 cases of MAM among 120 IDP/returnees children.

Child Protection

- UNICEF set up four child protection mechanisms in the town of Bagasola and four more in the Dar es Salam refugee camp. 140 members of these committees were trained on prevention and community based child protection.
- Five Safe Girls' Spaces were established in the Dar es Salam refugee camp.

Education

- To address decreased attendance of students in Dar es Salam schools, reportedly due to insufficient food, UNICEF advocated with parents and with local actors. Advocacy and provision of a daily snack has helped recover attendance.

WASH

- 3,369 newly displaced people in Hakouitchoulouma and Bagasola, as well as refugees from Niger received WASH kits and were taught how to treat water for drinking. This support was also provided to 108 displaced people in host communities in Bagasola.
- UNICEF partners regularly provide water treatment at the source in Dar es Salam refugee camp. In addition, 467 people were sensitized on personal hygiene and 180 trained on waste management at the refugee camp
