General comments	<p>In the context of 2020's hardships, the situation in Azerbaijan needs special attention – the COVID-19 pandemic, combined with the escalation of the Nagorno Karabakh conflict has left a significant impact on the welfare of the people of Azerbaijan and it has especially had severe consequences to the most vulnerable groups, including children.</p> <p>Many children living in the conflict affected regions live in insecurity and danger and many child victims do not have adequate access to medical and psychological care or comprehensive rehabilitation. This is a pressing matter needing immediate attention.</p>

Innovative solutions should be in the forefront of the priorities brought forward in the country programme, playing a significant role in building the resilience of health care, education and social policy systems. The COVID-19 pandemic has shed light on the digital divide in societies and the urgent need to support digital transformation.</p>
