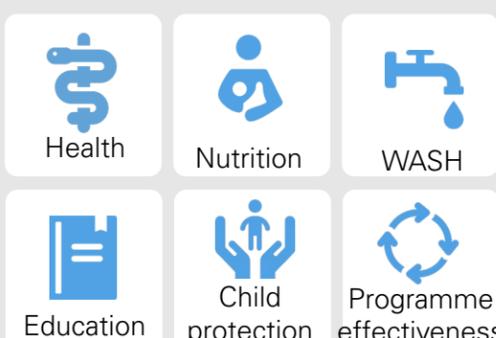
INTRODUCTION

Haiti is one of the 13 states with the most fragile contexts in the world. All this poses multiple development challenges in Haiti that have a considerable impact on the living conditions of Haitians, especially women and children.

Effectiveness

UNICEF has been able to improve access to:



and contributed to the transformation of social norms and behaviour change for the benefit of children's rights.

UNICEF also reinforced government capacities for:

- And contributed to improve of the policy and legislative frameworks

Taken into account in the design and implementation of the CP.

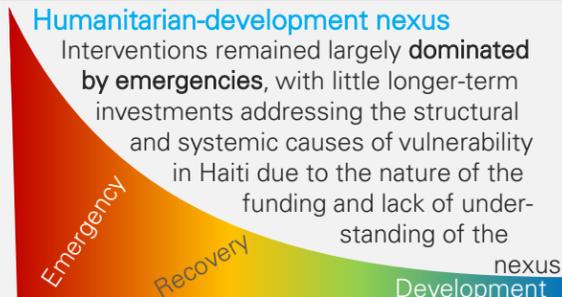


Youth and adolescent participation integrated into a clear strategy.

But there is need to work more with women's rights organizations.

Humanitarian-development nexus

Interventions remained largely dominated by emergencies, with little longer-term investments addressing the structural and systemic causes of vulnerability in Haiti due to the nature of the funding and lack of understanding of the nexus.



Coherence

Despite the willingness of the Country Office to work within a multisectoral coordination framework, and the implementation of some activities aimed at synergy, objectives and results in each sector have been defined and their monitoring carried out in silos.



UNICEF has made good contributions through joint projects with other UN Agencies, but each of the Agencies has continued to follow its own operating logic.

What rests to be done

Recommendations will be carefully considered by the CO Management Team and a Management Response will be elaborated providing a summary of the actions that UNICEF will take to address the recommendations contained in the evaluation report.

1 Conditions must be created to move towards effective implementation of these frameworks, including a political commitment to increase the allocation of resources to basic services.

2 The institutionalization of strengthened capacities is still fragile and needs to go through the structural adjustment of the vulnerability of Haitian systems (e.g., consolidation of public administration, staff motivation).

3 A large-scale and long-term implementation is necessary to create the desired social impact.

RECOMMENDATIONS ON DESIGN

1. Break with the project-based approach (short-term and limited scale) in favor of development interventions



4. Continue to advocate for the humanitarian-development nexus approach



2. Increase development, management, and use of knowledge to continue advocacy work for children's rights, and capacity building.



5. Work more on programme integration to address the challenges faced by Haitian children in a holistic and cross-sectoral manner.

3. Engage more in the areas of "public policies", "social protection", "fight against urban violence" and "protection against sexual exploitation and abuse"



6. Mainstream the gender dimension and youth participation in the development and implementation of all interventions. Women's rights organizations in Haiti should receive long-term support.



RECOMMENDATIONS ON IMPLEMENTATION



7. Replicate the successful experiences on a large scale and/or focus on interventions that have the potential to be replicated on a large scale.



8. Strengthen regional presence and maintain geographical choices, while continuing to work closely with the Government at the decentralized level.



9. Continue supporting to overcome the challenges of the COVID-19 crisis.



10. Operationalize the resource mobilization strategy.
