Goals

Basic quality education is a fundamental right for every child included in the Convention on the Rights of the Child. The BEYD programme aims to ensure that all girls and boys, including adolescents, complete free, equitable and inclusive quality Early Childhood and Development (ECD), primary and secondary education or non-formal education, leading to effective development and relevant learning outcomes and skills in preparation for life- long learning.

Specifically the program goals are:

- To ensure that national education sector strategies and systems are strong enough to address low survival rates and high internal systemic inefficiencies.
- To provide support to ensure that schools in 10 low performing districts record at least 50 percent increased retention, learning achievement, survival to grade 8 and transition rates to secondary education.


