



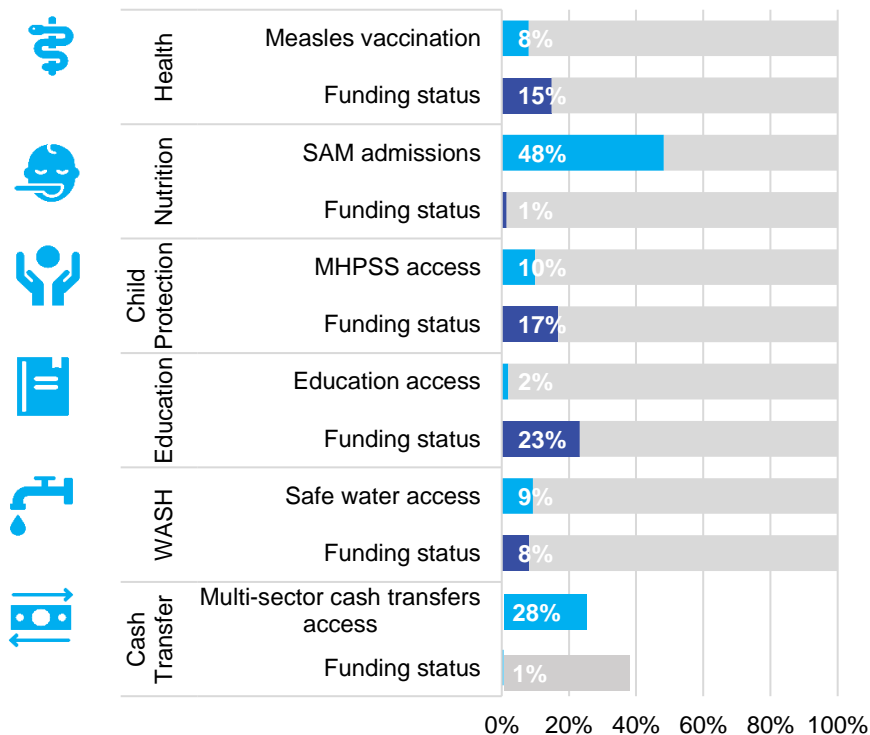

## Mid-Year Report: July 2021

### Highlights

- In the North-West/South-West regions the targeting of traditional leaders by Non State Armed Groups (NSAGs) marks a new turn in the form of violence taking place. In July, 1,204 people were displaced due to conflict in these two regions.
- In the Far-North region, seasonal flooding has left, 2,200 people in need of urgent humanitarian assistance.
- Despite insecurity in target regions, that has resulted in access constraints with funding shortfalls, UNICEF in Cameroon in July has:
  - Provided, 27,621 conflict-affected people in the North-West/South-West (NW/SW) regions with WASH kits.
  - Supported safer spaces for learning in the Far-North region. In September, 15,879 children affected by the Lake Chad Basin crisis will be attending education in a classroom where the teacher has been trained in psychosocial support and/or conflict and disaster risk reduction.
  - In the East and Adamaoua regions, 6,306 women and children were referred to and accessed GBV risk mitigation, prevention, or response interventions

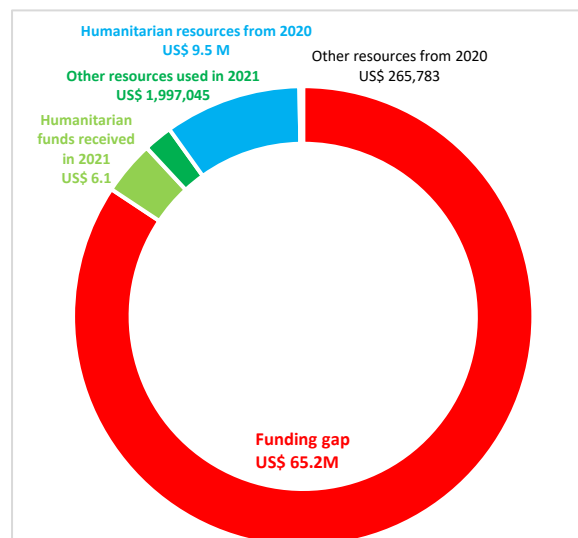

## Funding Overview and Partnerships

In 2021, UNICEF Cameroon is appealing for US\$83,074,000 in support of a lifesaving and protection-based response for children and women affected by humanitarian crises in Cameroon. The COVID-19 emergency response has been incorporated into the UNICEF Cameroon HAC 2021 appeal. As of July 2021, UNICEF had received US\$6,084,112 from the Government of Japan, Swedish SIDA, Directorate-General for European Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid Operations (DG-ECHO) and UNICEF's Global Thematic Funds. The office was also able to carry-over US\$9,471,837 from 2020. As we move into the second half of the year it is critical that we are able to respond to flood induced needs and prevent water borne diseases. UNICEF expresses its sincere gratitude to all public and private donors for their contributions.

## Situation Overview and Humanitarian Needs

Very little support this year, has been pledged or provided to meet the significant humanitarian needs in Cameroon. A total of 4.4 million people in Cameroon need humanitarian assistance because of on-going and protracted crises rooted in conflict, displacement, and periodic disease outbreaks. Cameroon continues to report daily cases of COVID-19 infections. As of July 28, 2021, only 283,694 people had been vaccinated with a first AstraZeneca dose and 52,873 fully vaccinated.

In July 2021, a further 1,204 people were internally displaced in in the NW/SW regions while 415 returned to their places of origin. Those that have returned to places of origin have found shelter in sub-standard buildings and continue to be exposed to the violent clashes between Non-State-Armed Groups (NSAGs) and the military forces. Their safety, especially children's is threatened by the presence of improvised explosive devices (IEDs). There is an urgent need to roll out Mine Risk Education (MRE) activities in schools, and in communities. Concurrently, attacks against education continue in the NW/SW regions. In July, they were directed towards students taking the Cameroon General Certificate Examinations. Further, in July there was an increase in the number of reported attacks against traditional leaders, in communities which marks a new and worrisome trend in the escalation of the conflict. "Ghost" or lockdown days continue to hinder humanitarian access and the delivery of humanitarian aid in the NW/SW regions. By July 2021, 71 days (or 14.2 working weeks) in 2021 have been lost to imposed lockdown days.

Cameroon is the second country most affected by the Lake Chad Basin Crisis. While 16 per cent of the population in the Far North is displaced, nearly half in the divisions are exposed to on-going predatory and criminal attacks, and abduction of civilians by NSAGs. However, leadership changes reported within NSAGs seem to have stabilized internal displacements in July with less movement recorded in the previous months although access constraints to natural resources including water and feeding grounds for livestock, have revived conflicts between IDPs and host community members. Adding to existing access constraints, largely caused by insecurity, has been heavy rainfall, that has added another impediment to accessing vulnerable populations. As of July 2021, floods have compounded the vulnerability of IDP in the Far-North, especially in Mayo-Sava division and added an additional 2,200 flood-affected people in need of humanitarian assistance. The floods not only displace individuals, damage infrastructure but limits access to essential, public services.

UNICEF remains concerned by the lack of proper resources and funding to secure its emergency response and to ensure the consolidation of results to support our efforts to build more resilient communities.

## Summary Analysis Program Response

### Nutrition<sup>1</sup>

#### Non-State Armed Groups (NSAG's) violence – Lake Chad Basin

In July 2021, in the Far-North region, UNICEF worked collaboratively with the Regional Delegation of the Ministry of Public Health to ensure the availability and access to treatment for children with severe acute malnutrition (SAM) in 366 health centres through the provision of essential nutrition supplies (RUTF, therapeutic milk, essential drugs) and WASH kits. A total of 4,676 children (2,931 boys and 1,745 girls) aged 6 to 59 months including 37 Minawao camp refugees were admitted into these UNICEF-supported health centres for treatment. Through home visits along with community demonstration sessions, 12,857 caregivers (8,357 women and 4,500 men) were sensitised on good Infant Young Child Feeding Practices (IYCF) and COVID-19 prevention activities in Maroua I, Mokolo, Moutourwa and Goulfey health districts. A total of 5,858 children aged 6-59 months were screened for wasting, of which 308 were screened by members of nutrition support groups or mothers that received training on the use of Mid-Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) tapes to screen children at home. Among the total of children screened, 273 were detected with moderate acute malnutrition (MAM) and 76 with severe acute malnutrition (SAM).

#### North-West/South-West Crisis

UNICEF provided supplies to the Regional Delegation of Public Health in NW/SW regions which allowed NGOs to conduct the screening of 7,851 children (3,738 boys and 4,113 girls) for SAM in very hard to reach and peri-urban areas.

The children were reached either through health facilities or mobile teams. In complement, 14,354 caregivers (10,191 women and 4,163 men) were sensitised on COVID-19 preventive practices and Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) practices.

## Health

### National

In July 2021, 303,050 Johnson & Johnson vaccine doses were delivered to Cameroon via the COVID-19 Vaccines Global Access (COVAX) with UNICEF as a key delivery partner.

From July 7 to 11, 2021, an intensive COVID-19 vaccine campaign was organized under the leadership of the Prime Minister.

### North-West/South-West Crisis

In July 2021, UNICEF supported the Regional Delegation of Public Health and UNICEF's implementing partners Caritas Kumba, Mamfe and Bamenda in the NW/SW regions to implement a catch-up vaccination campaign for children and pregnant women in seven health districts. As a result, 5,094 children aged 6 to 59 months were vaccinated against Measles/Rubella (MR). Also, 8,081 pregnant women were vaccinated against tetanus. Vitamin A supplementation was provided to 3,169 children and 547 children received deworming tablets. In addition, 5,860 children were treated for malaria. In total, 1,901 households were provided with Long-lasting insecticidal nets (LLINs). Care was also provided for 83 cases of severe diarrhoea. To avoid maternal and neonatal mortality, pregnant women and caregivers received 214 maternal care kits and 177 new-born kits. All activities were conducted with strict respect to COVID-19 barrier measures (use of face masks, handwashing, and hand sanitizers).

## WASH

### North-West/South-West crisis

In July 2021, UNICEF's implementing partners the Environmental and Protection Development Association (EPDA) and the Cameroon Baptist Convention Health Service (CBCHS) recruited and equipped 200 volunteers with the knowledge and skills to deliver COVID-19 prevention messages. They reached 46,658 vulnerable people (24,023 women and 22,635 men) with life-saving messages on COVID-19 prevention measures and sensitization on good hygiene and sanitation practices in the NW/SW regions. Also, 100 foot pedal operated hand sanitizers were installed in public places in Buea, Limbe, Tiko and Kumba (SW region) that will benefit more than 25,000 displaced and community host community members. In the same towns, 27,621 people were reached with critical WASH supplies and hygiene items including soaps and buckets with taps.

## Education

### National

UNICEF supported the Ministries of Primary Education (MINEDUB) and Secondary Education (MINESEC) to equip 340 teachers with the knowledge and skills to deliver psychosocial support and to identify and prepare to respond to risks, conflict, and disasters in schools, including COVID-19. Among them were 135 were women. The teachers trained will supervise 28,000 students directly.

Under the leadership of the Ministry of Basic Education, 105 participants (57 women) - including national, regional, and divisional pedagogical inspectors and advisers from the country's 10 regions alongside medical doctors took part in a four day - Training of Trainers on psychosocial support and risk mitigation. These participants are expected to support teachers and schools in the provision of psychosocial support and risk management, including the prevention of COVID-19.

### NSAGs' violence – Lake Chad Basin

In July 2021, with funding from the Global Partnership for Education (GPE) and Global Affairs Canada (GAC), UNICEF in Cameroon equipped 140 teachers, including 15 women with the knowledge and skills required to deliver basic psychosocial support and lead disaster risk reduction activities. As a result 15,879 students, including 6,789 girls will have access to more inclusive, sensitive and appropriate pedagogical approaches under the responsibility of the teachers that were trained.

Through the regional delegation of the Ministry of Basic Education (MINEDUB), A total of 1,251 vulnerable out-of-school children (55 per cent girls) were identified and enrolled in a one month accelerated curriculum program. Upon evaluation, they will be reintegrated into the formal education system for the new academic year 2021-2022. In Logone-and-Chari, Mayo-Sava and Mayo-Moskota subdivisions 56 teachers including eight women from nine schools in areas hosting internally displaced people (Kolofata, Makary, Mayo-Moskota and Mora) were equipped to deliver education in emergencies.

A total of 50 students (50 per cent girls) were identified in 10 schools to support school hygiene promotion, including COVID-19 prevention. Also, 200 girls were equipped with the knowledge and skills to promote menstrual hygiene among their peers. Through peer outreach activities 461 children including 337 girls were reached in Makary subdivision.

### North-West/South-West crisis

In July 2021, with the Government of Norway and ECHO funding, UNICEF equipped 200 teachers in the Littoral region with risk mitigation and psychosocial social support techniques to provide a safe learning environment for internally displaced students and prevent the transmission of COVID-19.

In the NW region (Mezam, Boyo, Ngo Ketunjia, Bui, and Momo areas), UNICEF's implementing partner Green Partners Association (GPA) distributed 641 solar radios to conflict-affected caregivers and out of school children. In parallel, 1,280 children, including 613 girls, were identified to participate in the radio learning program. Also, 24 radio learning program focal points including 11 women were identified. They benefited from a two-day training on i) the implementation and monitoring of the radio learning program, ii) approaches to sensitization and mobilization of communities and iii) risks and mitigation measures and maintenance of evaluation tools. They will supervise the implementation of the program and provide the necessary support to families targeted.

## Child Protection

### NSAGs' violence – Lake Chad Basin

In July 2021, UNICEF's implementing partners, Action Locale pour un Développement Participatif et Autogéré (ALDEPA) provided essential child protection services to 2,658 (1,316 girls and 1,342 boys) children previously identified and affected by armed conflict. Among them, 1,099 children (541 girls and 558 boys) are internally displaced, 1,156 (572 girls and 584 boys) are from the host community, 104 (53 girls and 51 boys) are refugees and 299 (150 girls and 149 boys) returnee children. To sensitise these children on the spread of COVID-19, 40 learning sessions were conducted with them on good hygiene practices.

ALDEPA conducted 13 positive parenting sessions to sensitize parents on useful tools to prevent the enrolment of their children into armed groups. Three hundred and seventy-three mothers (adults and adolescents) in Logone-and-Chari, Mayo-Sava and Mayo-Tsanaga were reached. Among them, 122 were internally displaced, 181 host community members, 13 refugees and 18 returnees. ALDEPA, through 178 inter-generational/inter-religious dialogues sensitised 5,486 people (1,210 girls, 1,182 boys, 1,269 women and 1,825 men) on the importance of: a prompt birth declaration (within three months after the birth) to obtain the birth certificate for free; women's empowerment, the promotion of income generating activities for women; and the promotion of social cohesion, equality, and non-violent attitudes within communities. Also, through sensitisation sessions, ADELPA equipped 72 Koranic teachers as peer educators. They are encouraged and equipped to promote among their colleagues and community's peaceful cohabitation, the right of education for children, COVID-19 prevention, and the benefits of dual koranic and formal education.

### North-West/South-West Crisis

In July 2021, UNICEF's implementing partners LUKMEF, and Street Child provided mental health and psychosocial support services (MHPSS) in child friendly and other safe spaces to 19,080 conflict-affected children (9,821 girls and 9,259 boys). Also, they identified, registered, and assessed 1,157 children (634 girls and 523 boys) for case management services. Among them, 442 cases (242 girls and 200 boys) were referred for specialized services through the CP AoR Referral Pathway. Additionally, 67 adolescent girls received dignity kits. The six community-based child protection mechanisms established in all 6 areas targeted for case management were supported and their members continue to work and provide referrals to caseworkers.

The steady acceleration of the rate of registration of vulnerable children for case management is encouraging. As of July 2021, a total of 3,891 children out of 4,500 were registered.

To address the absence of community feedback since the establishment of the toll-free line in March, UNICEF partners identified local community focal points charged to gather and provide feedback on behalf of their peers. As a result, 16 calls were recorded this month and are currently under review.

## Communication for Development (C4D)

### NSAGs' violence - Lake Chad Basin

In Kousseri health district, to ensure the continuity in the provision of an integrated package of basic maternal, new-born and child health care and services in the context of COVID-19, 146 community health workers were engaged in sensitisation campaigns. As a result, 1,060 interpersonal communication sessions were organised and 3,596 persons (1,177 men, 1,260 women and 1,159 children) were reached with lifesaving messages on COVID-19 prevention practices.

### North-West/South-West crisis

In July 2021, UNICEF supported 46 community radios to broadcast COVID-19 prevention and response messages. The 18 radio spots were broadcast in English, French, and Pidgin English to address different communities (bike riders, drivers, bar owners, market women and men, school staff, caregivers, and children). These messages were estimated to reach 1,120,540 people in July. The messages also promote the use of the toll-free number 1510 for additional information and community feedback. In total, call centres recorded 5,780 calls, mostly enquiring about the COVID-19 vaccine. Additionally, 2,391 people shared their feedback through community-based feedback mechanisms. Most



callers had queries regarding the different vaccines against COVID-19 and the availability of Johnson and Johnson vaccine.

In the NW/SW regions, to ensure the continuity in the provision of an integrated package of basic maternal, new-born and child health care and services in the context of COVID-19, 130 local community leaders were engaged and are committed to support COVID-19 sensitization, malaria and anaemia prevention, and immunization. As a result, 10,440 persons were reached with lifesaving messages on integrated health package including information on access to health services.

## East and Adamaoua Regions (refugee and host community response)

**Nutrition** - In the North, Adamawa and East regions, UNICEF's implementing partner African Humanitarian Action (AHA), and the Regional Public Health Delegation provided direct nutrition support to 531 health centres in these regions. Nutrition supplies were provided (RUTF, therapeutic milk, essential drugs) for children with severe acute malnutrition (SAM) along with WASH kits to ensure a complementary approach to support SAM treatment.

Community-based prevention of malnutrition activities identified through screening, 3,344 severely acute malnourished (SAM) children aged 6 to 59 months including 204 Central African Republican (CAR), refugee children. They were admitted into UNICEF-supported health centres for treatment. UNICEF's partners sensitised 32,082 caregivers (20,853 women and 11,229 men) on Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) practices integrating COVID-19 specific prevention messages in nine health districts in the East, Adamaoua and North regions. To boost early detection of wasting among children, mothers and community health workers were equipped with knowledge and skills to accurately use MUAC tapes. With their support, 27,415 children aged 6-59 months were screened for SAM among which 207 (106 girls and 101 boys) were moderately wasted and 89 (45 girls and 44 boys) severely wasted.

**WASH** – In July 2021, 20 boreholes were built in 20 schools in Kentzou, Kette and Garoua Boulai municipalities (East region) and Meiganga and Djohong municipalities (Adamaoua region). These boreholes will provide safe water to more than 14,076 students and inhabitants of target localities including 6,126 refugees.

**Education** – In July 2021, UNICEF and partners identified school children among the 600 newly arrived refugees relocated at Gado site in preparation for their integration into school, for the 2021/2022 academic year.

**Child Protection** – In July 2021, UNICEF's implementing partners International Medical Corp (IMC) and Main Solidaire provided psychosocial support to 158 children (79 girls and 79 boys) through listening and counselling sessions, recreational activities, painting, and educational talks. Among them, seven gender-based violence cases were registered and documented according to survivor's consent. Two thousand, four hundred and one (2,401) people that included (332 girls, 1,370 women, 170 boys and 529 men) were reached in Garoua Boulai, Ketté, Meiganga, Batouri, Ngaoui and Bertoua with key information on recognising, mitigating, and addressing gender-based violence. The sessions were also used to share information on sexual exploitation and COVID-19 prevention strategies.

In Garoua Boulai and Betare Oya, through 87 sessions organised by community-based child protection mechanisms (CBCPMs) 3,870 people (1,223 women, 1,179 men, 793 boys and 675 girls) were sensitised. Also, CBCPMs identified 30 children at risk or victims of violence, abuse, and exploitation. Among them, 14 (seven, boys and seven, girls) were involved in child labour and 16 were victims of violence and neglect (seven, girls and nine, boys).

Also 14 denunciations, four referrals and four mediations were carried out. One hundred and sixty-one birth certificates, of the 252 birth declarations deposited (in July) for 91 girls and 70 boys were collected through birth registration community-based mechanisms in Garoua Boulai, Mandjou and Bétaré Oya districts.

A total of 33 participants (29 women and four men) from seven national Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) and eight Confession Based Organisations (CBOs) were equipped with knowledge to better understand gender-based violence (GBV) and skills to deliver psychological first aid through a two-day training hosted in Bertoua. This training aimed to strengthen the local and community actors' capacities on GBV prevention and response. On-going support will be provided by the CSO through coaching sessions on case management.

**Communication for Development** – In July 2021, in Bertoua, UNICEF provided technical and financial support for a COVID-19 sensitization campaign to be conducted to generate COVID-19 vaccine demand at the community level. To this effect, 210 community leaders and health committee members were engaged to support interpersonal communication sessions. In Adamaoua region, the Lamido of Ngaoundere launched an appeal among peers to raise awareness at community level for massive vaccination against COVID-19.

## Humanitarian Leadership, Coordination, Strategy and Partnerships

The Humanitarian/Resident Coordinator in-country leads humanitarian coordination efforts, supported by UN OCHA. At the national level, UNICEF and the Government are co-leading the Nutrition, WASH and Education sectors, as well as the Area of Responsibility for Child Protection. In the Far-North region, UN OCHA leads inter-sector coordination for

out-of-camp refugees, IDPs and host communities, while UNHCR oversees coordination for the refugee response in the East, Adamawa, North and Far-North regions. In the NW/SW regions, clusters are activated to support the humanitarian response. UNICEF leads for the WASH, Nutrition and Education clusters and the Child Protection Area of Responsibility.

In response to the COVID-19 outbreak, UNICEF co-leads with the government the joint pillar on Risk Communication and Community Engagement. The Strategic Council presided by the Ministry of Public Health leads the strategic coordination of the COVID-19 response. Its decisions are guided by a Scientific Committee. The Incident Management System informs the national and decentralised response. The COVID-19 National Plan for 2021 revolves around three strategic objectives: reduction of coronavirus transmissions, curve associated morbidity and mortality, and mitigate the health and socio-economic impact of COVID-19 on the population. The national COVID-19 response planning for 2021 has shifted to a more integrated approach, rather than one led by pillars. The response plan has also included the roll out of a COVAX vaccination campaign.

To respond to the complex and increasing humanitarian needs of children and women in Cameroon, UNICEF's 2021 HAC prioritises: 1) mainstreaming of COVID-19 barrier measures and a response through all its interventions; 2) emphasize needs-based assessment and needs-based resource mobilization with support from data investments for evidence, targeting and advocacy, including the documentation of conflict on children; 3) strengthening gender transformative programming; 4) supporting predictable partnerships with national and international non-governmental organizations that includes capacities for compliance, technical training and quality monitoring, including third-party monitoring; and 5) stronger articulation between humanitarian and development interventions.

## Communication

From January to July 2021, communication and advocacy products focused on COVID-19, alternative learning, inclusive education, psychosocial and disaster risk reduction training of community members and teachers.
