






UNICEF has signed **USD 53.4 million** worth of new implementing partnership agreements for refugee-receiving countries since March 1 2022.



Scaling-up UNICEF operational capacity in the refugee response

Prior to the emergency, UNICEF had country programmes and offices in 4 countries engaged in the current refugee response, with a total of 106 regular staff members.



UNICEF is now scaling-up operational capacity by recruiting 222 new staff across 8 countries. including 4 countries without previous **UNICEF** country office and programme presence.

Currently, UNICEF has 86 surge staff supporting the refugee response across 8 countries and UNICEF's Regional Office (ECARO), including 4 countries without previous UNICEF programme and country office presence.
