

### **UNICEF Spilno Spots**

UNICEF is leveraging its technical expertise to have **cross sectoral programming in "Spilno Spots"** that are being set up across Ukraine to support children affected by the war. **Spilno means "together" in Ukrainian. A Spilno spot is a center for connecting children with child protection services** (including mental health and psycho-social support), learning, first aid and referrals for additional health services, and registration for humanitarian cash assistance.

# Highlights from UNICEF's emergency response in Ukraine

### Humanitarian Cash Transfer (HCT)

Following the previous 5-fold increase, UNICEF Ukraine has measured consecutive staggering increases in HCT coverage. During the current reporting period, UNICEF measured a 4-fold increase in its programmatic effectiveness for households reached with UNICEF funded multipurpose humanitarian cash transfers from 6,523 households to 24.764.

In total, within a period of 4 weeks, there was a 20-fold increase from 1,251 households to 24,764 households reached.

### **Spilno spots**

There are in total 200 operational Spilno spots and Spilno mobile services across the country, including indoor and outdoor formats. New locations have been agreed in a recent weeks in Zhytomyr region, and Odesa for further expansion of local partnerships.


**Operational Spilno spots**

## Scaling-up UNICEF operational capacity for the response
