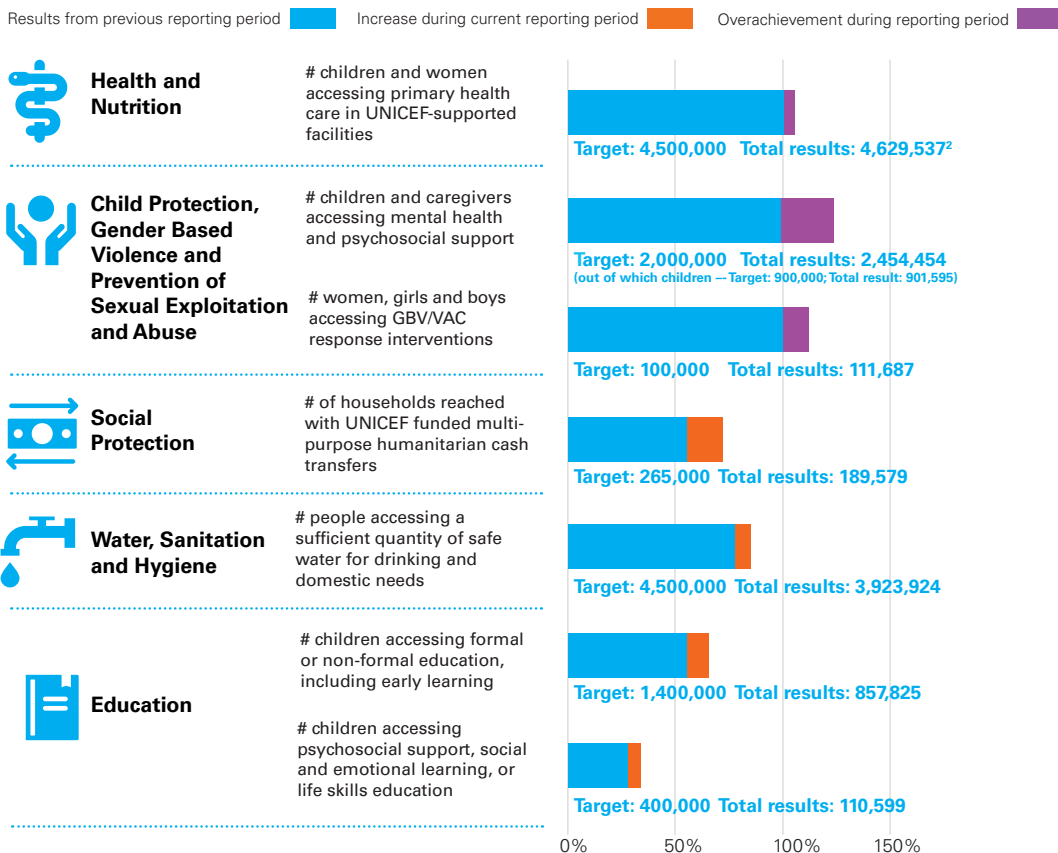

Ukraine Programme Targets and Results for 2022¹



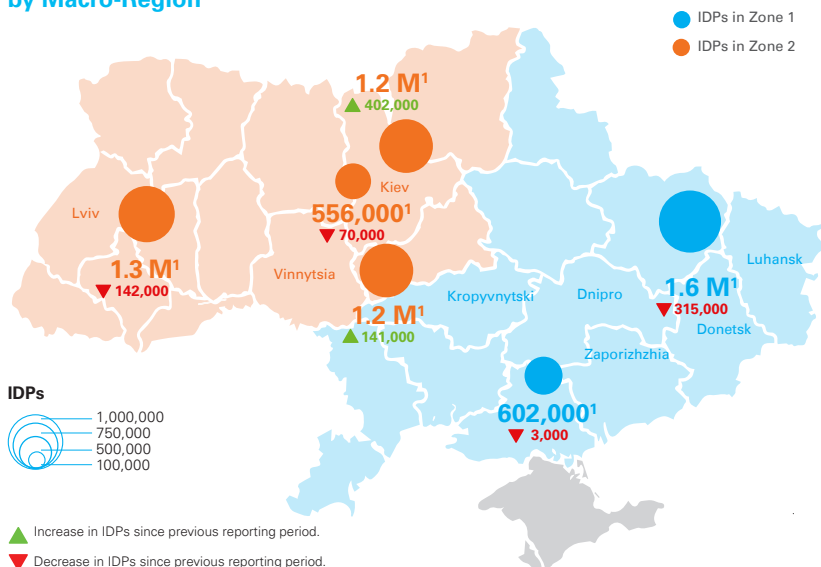

Winterization and Emergency Response in Newly Accessible Areas

UNICEF winterization plans are underway to support vulnerable women and children in severely affected areas impacted by declining temperatures, damaged energy infrastructure and shrinking local markets for heating solutions. The approaching winter remains a key focus of the humanitarian response with UNICEF and humanitarian organizations distributing winter supplies, helping repair collective centers, and providing cash to cover essential costs at institutional and household levels in hard-to-reach areas.

- UNICEF responded to the acute needs of the internally displaced population by pre-positioning 240 tons of winterization and WASH supplies at collective centers as well as via direct distributions to an estimated 4,000 vulnerable families with children in collaboration with local civil society organizations and relocation authorities in Central and Eastern Ukraine.
- UNICEF participated in inter-agency convoys delivering food, water, hygiene kits, shelter materials and winterization supplies to thousands of families and children in newly accessible areas of Kharkiv, Donetsk and Kherson oblasts that were cut off from humanitarian assistance for more than five months. Life-saving supplies were pre-positioned in frontline communities to immediately expand UNICEF's emergency response.

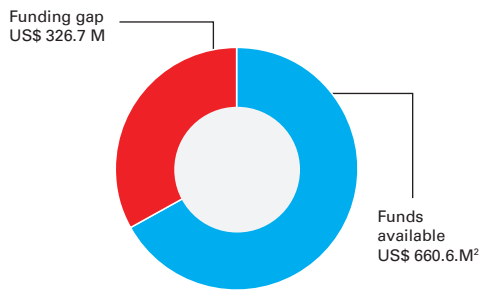

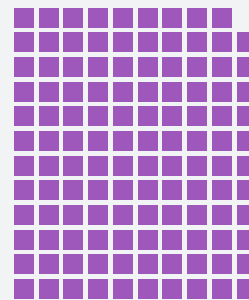
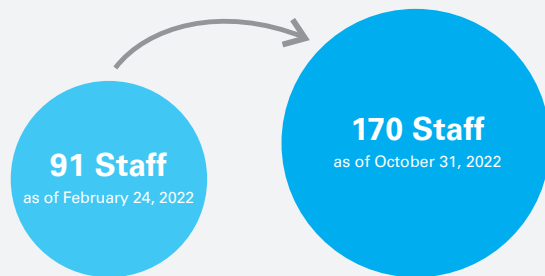

Partners

UNICEF continues to work with the Government of Ukraine, United Nations agencies, civil society organizations (CSOs)/non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and other humanitarian partners. Close consultations are also being held with Presidential advisors, key ministries (Foreign Affairs; Social Policy; Education; Youth; and Health), and mayors in several cities (including through Child and Youth Friendly Cities) and the Ombudspersons Office. Through its long-standing presence in Ukraine, UNICEF has established partnerships in key hromadas (municipalities) and will continue to expand these in all oblasts (regions).
