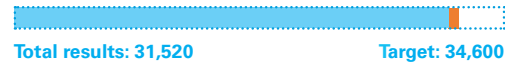

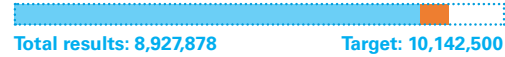

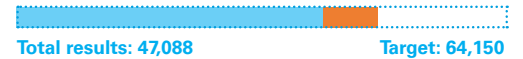

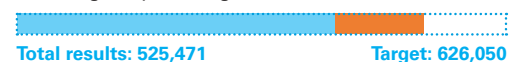

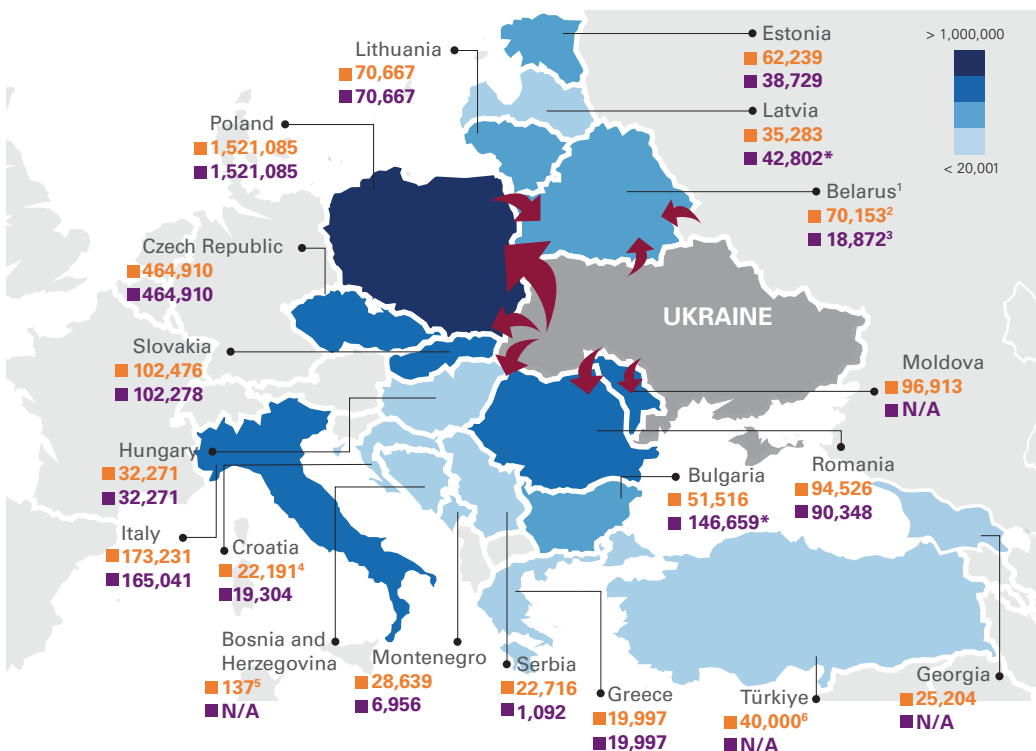

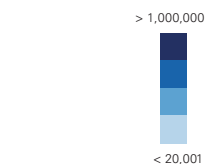

**52 (100%\*)** supported reception centers and accommodation facilities have appropriated access to WASH facilities and services

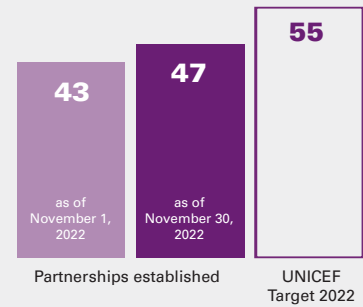
**55,085 (92%\*)** children have been accessing appropriate WASH facilities and services

**100,129 (46%\*)** people have been enabled to access sufficient safe water for drinking and domestic needs



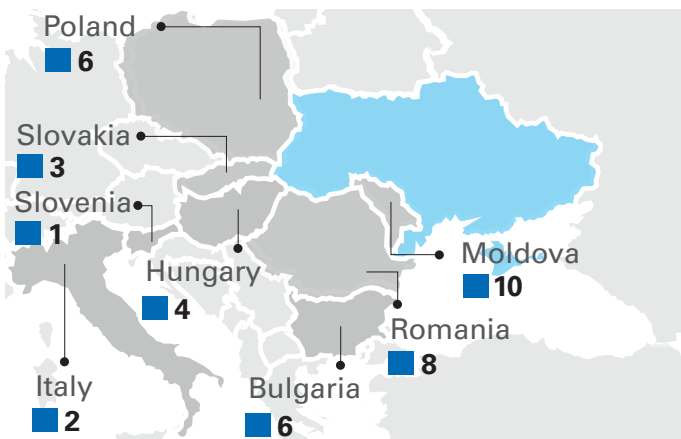

### Blue Dots

Established (operational)\*

**40** Bulgaria, Hungary Italy, Moldova Poland, Romania, Slovak Republic and Slovenia

Blue Dots are established jointly by UNICEF and UNHCR in collaboration with local authorities and partners. They provide safe spaces in Ukraine's neighboring countries enabling access to cross sectoral services for children and families, identification, registration and connect to protection services for children traveling on their own. They also offer referral services for women, including for support on gender-based violence.

As part of preparedness for new refugee movements due to the continued war and the winter season, efforts are ongoing to scale up UNICEF-UNHCR Blue Dots in strategic locations to provide multi-sectoral humanitarian response to children and families on the move.

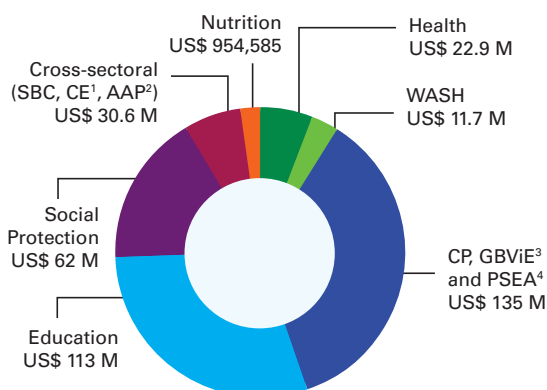

## Funding UNICEF Appeal 2022 US\$ 377.2 M\*

Thanks to generous donor contributions, immediate needs are met, allowing UNICEF to continue address critical needs, including continuation of learning; immediate investments in preparedness for new refugee arrivals; and support to readiness for winter in anticipation of a harsh season. Critical investments to strengthen national systems to ensure refugee children can access critical protection and basic services are also being sustained.

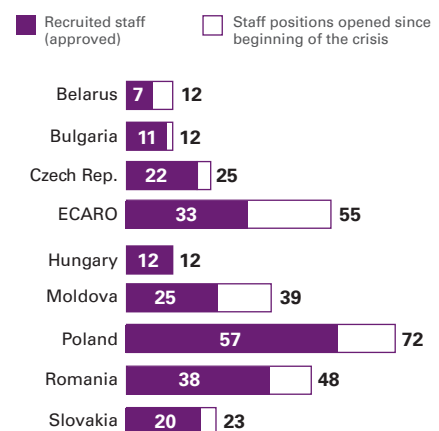

## Human Resources

Since beginning of the crisis, UNICEF quickly mobilized specialized staff and surge support to strengthen the emergency response in neighboring and secondary movement countries.

As the response stabilizes, UNICEF created total **300 new staff positions** outside Ukraine and is accelerating the recruitment process with **236** positions already filled:
