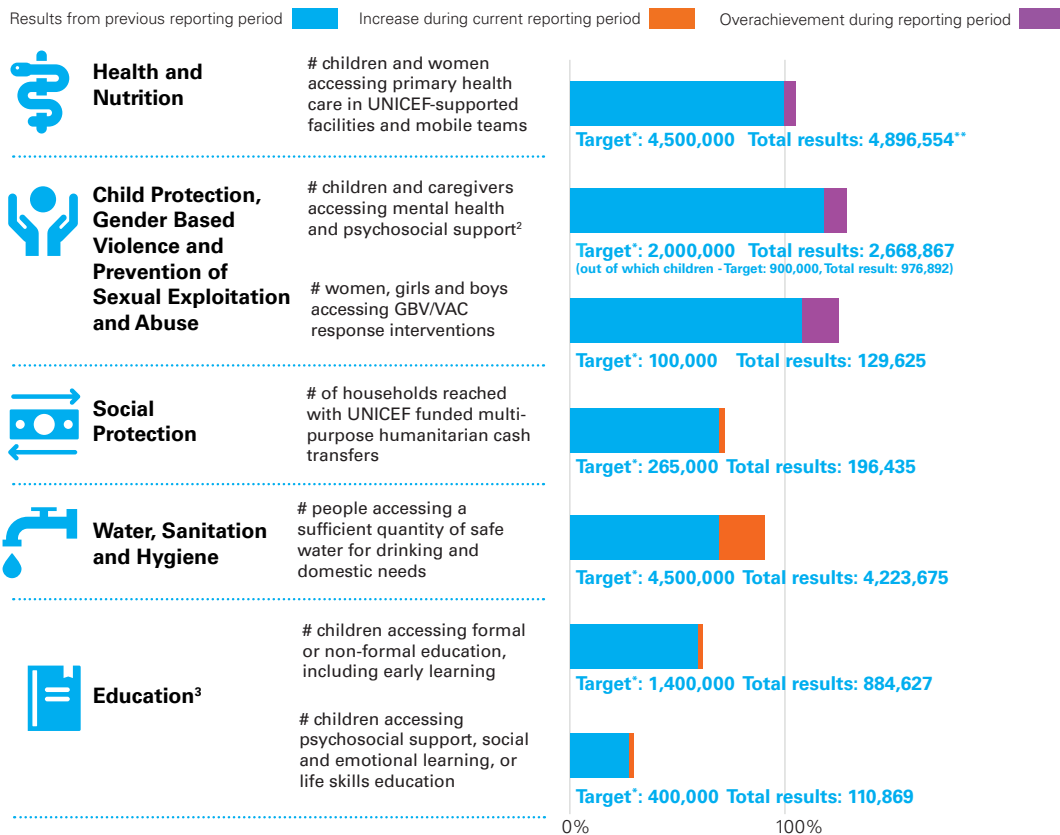

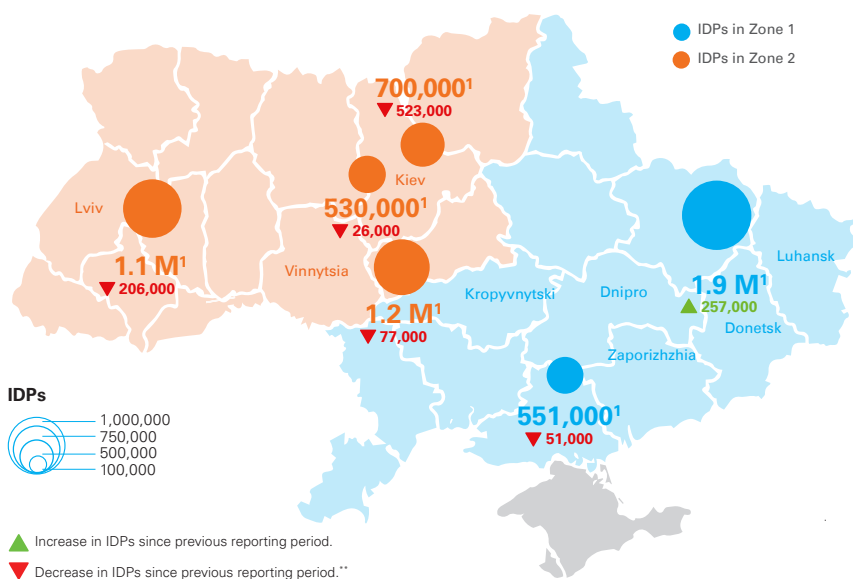

Situation Overview and Humanitarian Needs

Full-scale war and attacks persist across Ukraine. Strikes on critical infrastructure have resulted in widespread outages of power, heating, water and wastewater services, impacting children and families. Waves of attacks on energy infrastructure have forced the country to adopt emergency power cuts in all regions at a time when temperatures are below zero in many parts of the country.

UNICEF conducted 34 missions to affected areas in the east and south of Ukraine providing water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) supplies along with hygiene kits and essential medicine for families who were left without health services for extended periods of time.

An estimated 5.9M IDPs are displaced across Ukraine representing a slight decrease compared to 6.5M as of the end of October.¹ Among these, 680,000 have been newly displaced within the last 30 days, however. Most of these new displacement movements took place from locations in the East (43%) and South (25%).²

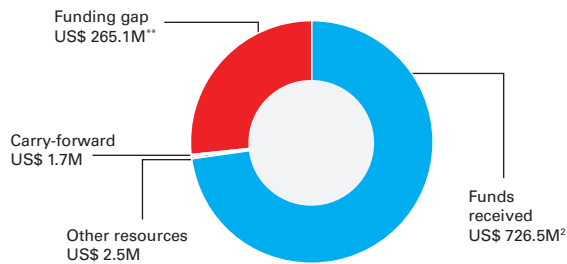

Partners

UNICEF continues to work with the Government of Ukraine, United Nations agencies, civil society organizations (CSOs)/non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and other humanitarian partners. Close consultations are also being held with Presidential advisors, key ministries (Foreign Affairs; Social Policy; Education; Youth; and Health), and mayors in several cities (including through Child and Youth Friendly Cities) and the Ombudspersons Office. Through its long-standing presence in Ukraine, UNICEF has established partnerships in key hromadas (municipalities) and will continue to expand these in all oblasts (regions). A total of 88 government, civil society and financial services partners engaged with UNICEF to respond to the critical needs of children and families across Ukraine.
