## SITUATION OVERVIEW

The conflict in Sudan which erupted in April 2023 continues to have devastating consequences for civilians. Hundreds of people have been killed and hundreds of thousands have been injured or forced to flee their homes. Egyptian Ministry of Foreign Affairs shared that the total number of people who have fled Sudan to Egypt since 14 April 2023 is 279,000 Sudanese (50 per cent of them are children) and 7,230 third Country Nationals (TCN), an increase of 22,000 Sudanese and 1,665 TCN from the figures in late June 2023 (250,000 individual Sudanese and 5,565 individual TCN).

As of 31 July 2023, UNHCR Egypt reports a total of more than 500,000 registered refugees and asylum seekers in the country, amongst of which, 279,000 (56 per cent) arrived from Sudan since the new conflict started on 15 April. As of 31 July, UNHCR registered 34,663 Sudanese, 50 percent are children<sup>1</sup>.

## UNICEF RESPONSE

### WASH

- UNICEF and WHO, as members of the WASH sector, led by the UNICEF, have conducted an assessment mission on 02 August 2023 to Aswan Governorate in Upper Egypt to assess the WASH facilities at primary healthcare units and public hospitals for potential implementation of rehabilitation works for WASH facilities and to support the waste management systems to effectively collect and dispose of waste, reducing environmental contamination and minimizing the risk of disease transmission and outbreaks.
- Results achieved under WASH sector since 15 April 2023: a) 12 mobile toilets (Total 72 chambers), b) 3,000 dignity kits, c) 40,000 people had access to sufficient and quality of safe water for drinking water and domestic needs, and d) 23,000 people reached with sanitation services.

### Child Protection

- The number of detained children on the move has reached 106 children. UNICEF, along with the members of the Detention Taskforce (UNHCR and IOM), is following up on this matter with the concerned national entities.
- Results achieved under Child Protection sector since 15 April 2023: 5,600 children received Mental Health and Psychosocial Support services (MHPSS).

### Education

- UNICEF is working with the Ministry of Education and Technical Education (MoETE) on a concept note for the inclusion of Sudanese curricula into Egypt's online education platform, Madrasatna<sup>2</sup>. The concept note was cleared, and its action plan is currently in the process of design between UNICEF and MoETE.
- UNICEF is planning a back-to-school campaign for Sudanese school students in Aswan Governorate targeting more than 140,000 children. Additionally, UNICEF, in collaboration with implementing partners, is targeting 13,000 children of different nationalities including Sudanese with a campaign to provide financial grants to cover education tuition. More details with segregated data will be reported on this when available.

### Social Policy

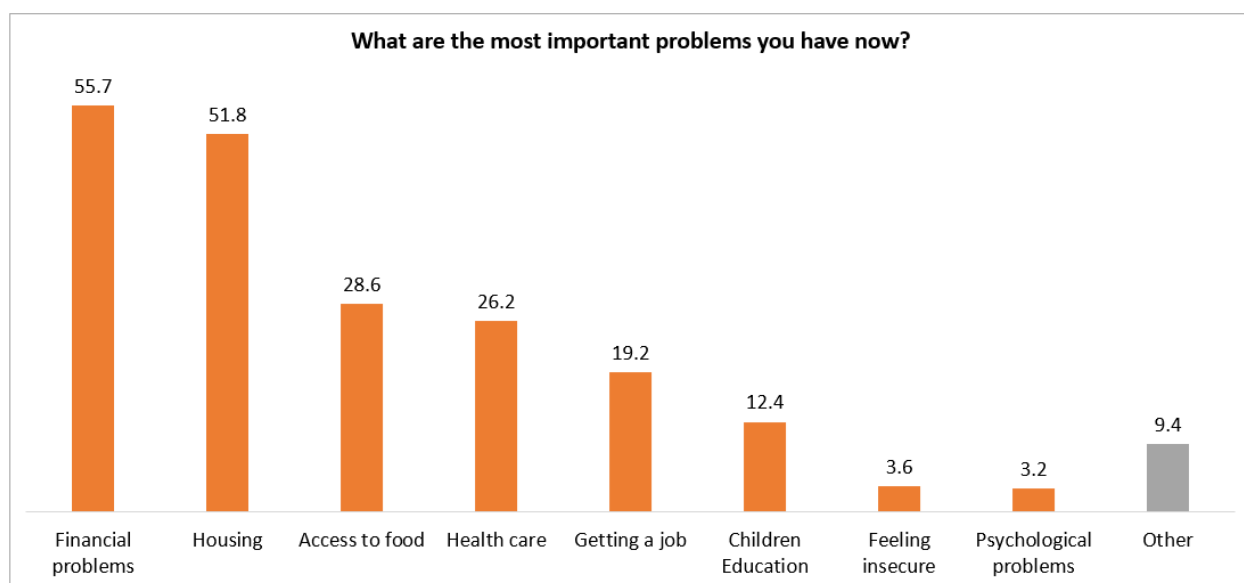
- The WFP-UNICEF cash transfer programme is ongoing reaching communities in five governorates (Cairo Giza Qalyobiya, Aswan and Alexandria). Current figure of Sudanese who registered in this programme stands at 50,800 individuals. Due to the challenging economic situation, the distribution will be extended to six times instead of only three. This is based on the results on the phone survey mentioned in the below section.

## Social and Behavioral Change, Accountability to Affected Populations & Localization

- UNICEF has concluded round 1 of the assessment of newly arrived Sudanese. Initial key findings were presented by UNICEF to all members of the Interagency Working Group (IAWG) as well as a few key development partners. Below graph shows the most important problems mentioned in the survey. The problems are (Financial problems-housing-access to food-healthcare-getting a job-children education-feeling insecure-psychological problems)

## SUPPLIES

- 15,000 dignity kits were received by Sudan Country Office and delivered to the Sudanese Red Crescent Society.
- Purchase Order for the shipment of chlorine gas has been issued by Sudan Country Office. Ongoing coordination with Supply Division is underway to facilitate the shipment to Sudan. UNICEF ECO is liaising with government partners to ensure safe and timely delivery of the chlorine gas.
