## UNICEF BANGLADESH Humanitarian Situation Report No. 69

Reporting Period: 1 January to 30 September 2024

### Situation in Numbers

### Highlights

- By September 2024, a total of **18.4 million people** have been impacted by cyclone Remal and recurrent floods, leaving an estimated **6.4 million** in need of immediate assistance in 29 districts, which accounts for 45 per cent of the 64 total districts.
- As of September 2024, nearly **46,465** new refugees have been recorded since the beginning of the year (source: UNHCR). Bangladesh continues to host over **1 million Rohingya refugees** from Myanmar in **33 camps** in Cox's Bazar District and Bhasan Char (35,629 refugees) in Noakhali District, **52 per cent** of them children (56 per cent in Bhasan Char).
- During the period under review, **UNICEF has reached 1,88 million people** (897,256 children, 948,633 females, 46,059 persons with disabilities), through multi-sectoral responses - WASH, Child protection, Education, Nutrition, Humanitarian Cash Transfers and Health interventions.
- UNICEF seconded one staff to strengthen overall coordination and support the government in establishing area-based coordination structures in the flood affected districts of Feni, Cumilla, Noakhali and Lakshimpur.
- UNICEF has supported **241,653 Rohingya children** (115,928 girls) in Early Childhood Development, Early Childhood Education, Myanmar Curriculum, and Skills/Vocational Education and Training in Cox's Bazar and Bhasan Char. This includes 223,487 children (106,633 girls) in the Myanmar Curriculum, where UNICEF is providing 89 per cent of formal education.
- Overall, a funding gap of **US\$31 million** (21 per cent of the Humanitarian Action for Children-2024) remains, restricting UNICEF's ability to fully meet the priority needs of vulnerable girls, women, and people with disabilities.

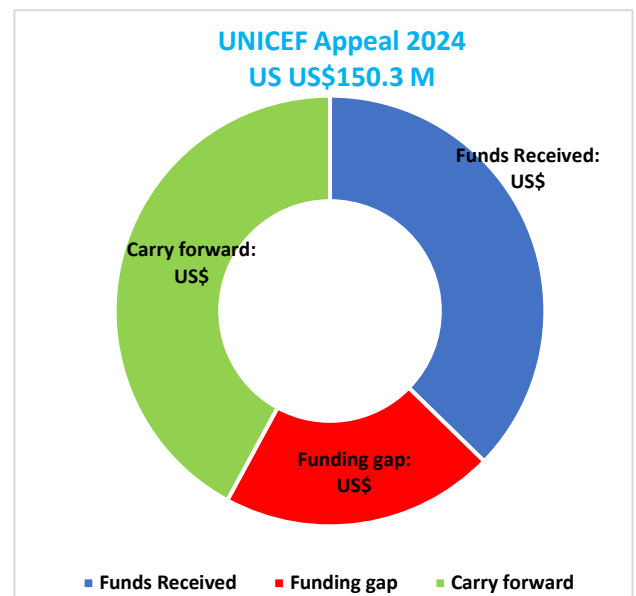
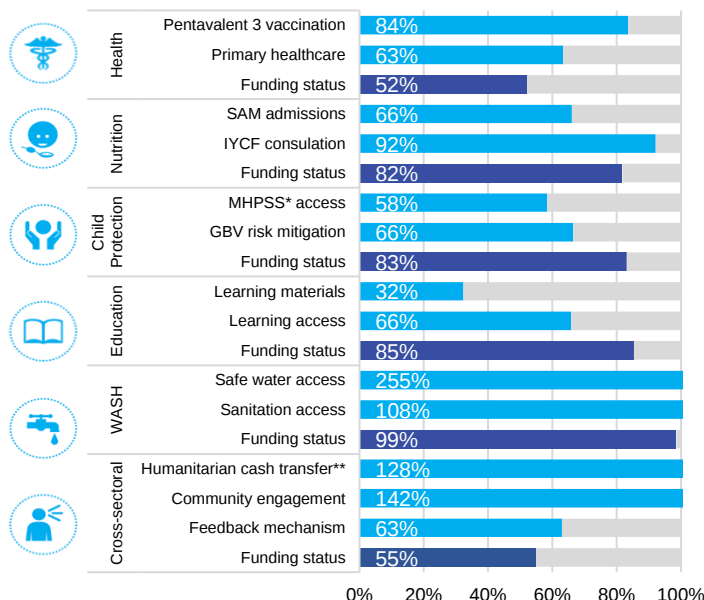

## Funding Overview and Partnerships

In 2024, UNICEF's Humanitarian Action for Children (HAC) requires **US\$150.3 million** to meet the critical needs of **6.7 million people**, including **3 million children** affected by multiple shocks in Bangladesh. The funds enabled UNICEF in partnership with the Government and Civil Society Organisations (CSOs), to deliver integrated services in WASH, Nutrition, Education, Child Protection, Health, and Social and Behavior Change (SBC) services to protect children's rights in alignment with the Core Commitments of Children in Humanitarian Action across Bangladesh including the refugee response in Cox's Bazar. During reporting period, UNICEF Bangladesh Country Office has received **US\$119.3 million (79 per cent of the funding requirements)**, leaving a funding gap of **US\$31 million (21 per cent)**. This includes contributions from private and public sector donors who invest in both thematic and non-thematic programmes under this year's HAC.

UNICEF expresses its sincere gratitude to the World Bank, Japan, Denmark, European Union ECHO, United States Agency for International Development (USAID), Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration (BPRM), Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), Global Partnership for Education (GPE), GAVI, UNICEF Gulf Area Office (GAO), UNOCHA CERF, USA NatCom, German NatCom, Australian NatCom, Education Cannot Wait (ECW), Swedish NatCom, and various other UNICEF National Committees and local donors for their generous contributions to this response. At the same time, UNICEF acknowledges the current critical funding gap (especially in Health (48 per cent), Cross-sectoral (45 per cent), and Emergency Preparedness (55 per cent), which will be moderately addressed through anticipated funds in the fourth quarter of 2024. As Bangladesh is on track to be a lower middle income country by 2026, the operating environment remains challenging, with decreasing donor interest in the country. In 2024, UNICEF continues to manage challenges to efficiently respond to the needs of vulnerable communities, women and children. To ensure the growing needs are met, flexible and multi-year donor funding for the 2024 HAC will be crucial in providing required essential support to Rohingya refugees and the most vulnerable women and children in Bangladesh.

## Situation Overview & Humanitarian Needs<sup>4</sup>

Bangladesh continues to host **1,003,394 Rohingya refugees**<sup>5</sup> from Myanmar across 33 camps in Cox's Bazar District and Bhasan Char in Noakhali District; 52 per cent of them are children (56 per cent in Bhasan Char). As part of the Rohingya Refugee relocation plan by the Government of Bangladesh to the Bhasan Char island, a cumulative number of **35,629 refugees** have been relocated by 30 September 2024. The humanitarian community continues to ensure the provision of basic services for the refugees in Cox's Bazar and Bhasan Char. However, water-borne disease outbreaks, malnutrition, inadequate health facilities, lack of educational opportunities for adolescents, increased insecurity in the camps, and the risks of sexual exploitation and violence, including Gender Based Violence (GBV), threaten the safety and well-being of children in the camps.

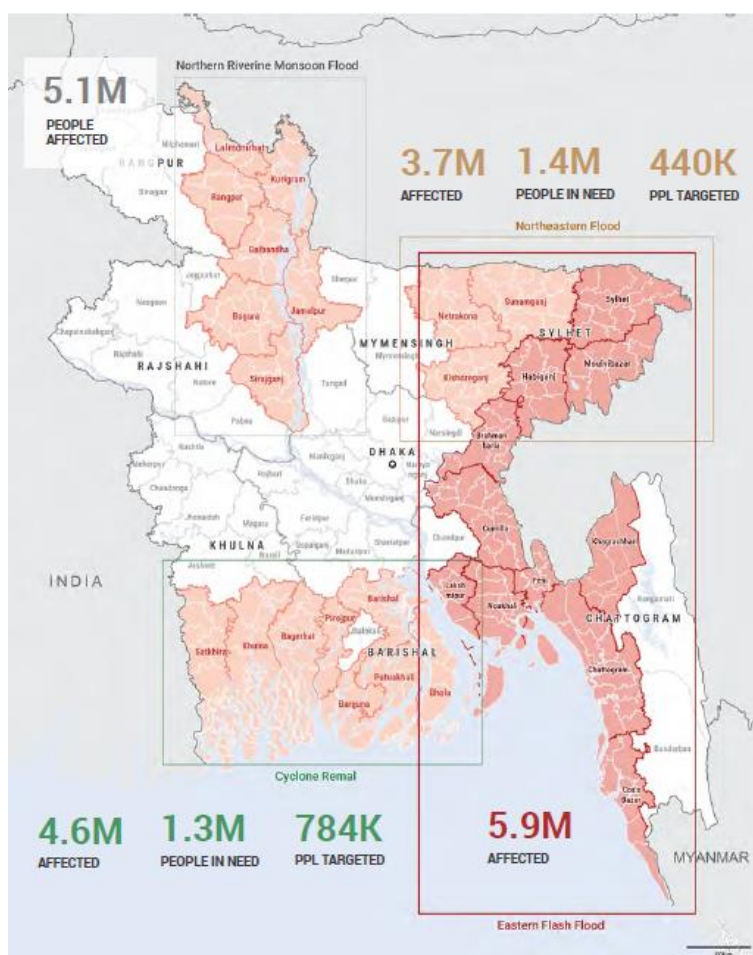
The ongoing conflict in Myanmar continues to be a concern. Official entry into Bangladesh by new asylum seekers remains restricted. However, an influx of new refugees has been recorded since the beginning of 2024 with up to 46,465 registered by UNHCR as of September 2024. The new arrivals are now able to access lifesaving assistance after formal registration, which enables them to receive food rations and medical care among other services.

Moreover, since May 2024, the humanitarian situation in Bangladesh has severely worsened by cyclone and series of monsoon floods, which have affected a total of **18.4 million people (7.11 million children aged 0-19, and 252,080 people with disabilities)**. On May 26, 2024, tropical Cyclone Remal severely hit the southern part of Bangladesh. A rapid needs assessment by the Inter-agency Needs Assessment Working Group (NAWG) found that **4.6 million people** were impacted by the cyclone across 19 districts (**2.24 million women, 1.79 million children ages 0-19, 61,889 pregnant women, and 65,422 persons with disabilities**)<sup>6</sup> with 18 deaths reported. Pirojpur, Khulna, Bagerhat, Satkhira, Patuakhali, Barguna, Bhola, and Barisal remain the most affected districts. The tidal surge breached embankments, resulting in extensive flooding and damage to homes, infrastructure, forests, agricultural fields and fishing farms in low-lying areas. Initial data from the Department of Public Health Engineering (DPHE) in the eight severely affected districts identified **20,260 water points and 134,269 latrines damaged**. Cyclone Remal resulted in a loss of approximately **US\$600 million** across 20 districts of the country.

Further, in mid-June, another flood struck the northeastern region, displacing over 700,000 people, and affecting **3.74 million** people across six districts, with 1.4 million in urgent need of humanitarian aid. This second wave of floods devastated Sylhet and Sunamganj, damaging **917** government primary schools, and resulting in **991 additional schools repurposed as flood shelters**, disrupting the education of **600,000** learners (including 300,000 girls). Additionally, **147 learning centers under the Let Us Learn (LUL) project** were damaged, impacting **2,637 out-of-school learners (1,319 girls)**.

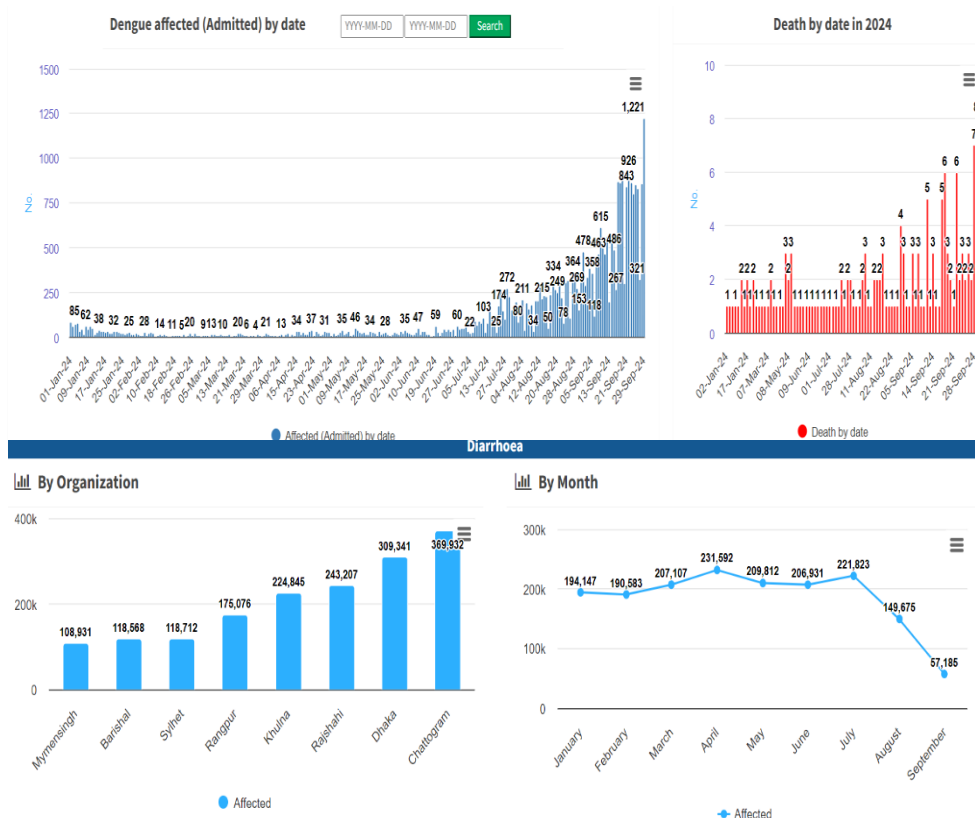
Water and sanitation infrastructure suffered extensive damage, leaving **86% of water points and 84% of sanitation facilities** unusable. The contamination of water sources led to over **126,500** cases of acute watery diarrhea (AWD), with children and mothers in Khulna, Barishal, and Sylhet divisions being the most affected.

In early July, floods in the northern region displaced 260,000 people, and the rising water levels affected **5.13 million** people in the Jamuna River basin.

On August 21, 2024, a third wave of floods hit 11 districts (out of 64) in eastern Bangladesh, affecting **5.8 million** people and causing 67 deaths. Over **7,000 schools** were closed, impacting **1.75 million students**. The floods Damaged nearly 300,000 hectares of cropland and led to widespread

waterborne diseases, with over 4,700 cases of AWD, skin diseases, and respiratory infections reported. Close to 1.8 million people required urgent food assistance as a result of the Eastern floods.

Public health emergencies<sup>7</sup> continue to threaten vulnerable populations in Bangladesh, particularly frequent disease outbreaks including dengue. By September 29, 2024, **29,786 dengue cases** have been reported, **85** per cent lower than the same period in 2023, when **200,981 cases** were reported. The number of dengue-related deaths as of September 29, 2024, is **158** compared to **975** for the same period in 2023, with a case fatality rate of 0.53 per cent (0.67 per cent in 2023). As of September 29, 2024, there were around **1.7 million** reported cases of Acute Watery Diarrhea (AWD) nationwide which is **45% higher** compared to the same period in 2023 (755,543 Cases). Additionally, **193 cholera cases** emerged in the Rohingya camps between June 23 and September 30, 2024, caused by stagnant water from cyclones and floods<sup>8</sup>. These outbreaks cause a strain on the health system and highlight the critical need for ongoing investment to address public health challenges.

## Summary Analysis of Programme Response<sup>9</sup>

### Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)

#### National Level

- A total of **1,875,453 people** (897,256 children, 948,633 females, 46,059 persons with disabilities), have gained access to a sufficient quantity of safe water for drinking and domestic needs (**255 per cent of the target**).<sup>10</sup>
- A total of **511,939 people** (252,701 children, 266,116 females, 5,726 persons with disabilities) have accessed safe and appropriate sanitation facilities (**108 per cent of the target**) during this reporting period.

#### Cox's Bazar (Rohingya and Host Community)

- **276,779 refugees** living in camps (142,223 females, 2,210 persons with disabilities), **25,601 host community members** (13,554 females and 124 persons with disabilities) and **17,445 refugees** in Bhasan Char (8,962 females, 167 persons with disabilities) accessed a sufficient quantity and quality of water for drinking and domestic needs (**103 per cent of the target in camps, 40 per cent of the target in host community and 44 per cent of the target in Bhasan Char achieved**).
- **275,360 refugees** living in camps (140,010 females, 2,211 persons with disabilities), **129,529 host community members** (71,992 females and 839 persons with disabilities) and **17,445 refugees** in Bhasan Char (8,962 females, 167 persons with disabilities) accessed an appropriate sanitation services (**103 per cent of the target in camps, 138 per cent of the target in the host community and 44 per cent of the target in Bhasan Char achieved**).
- **183,210 refugees** living in camps (93,246 females, 1,397 persons with disabilities), **313,240 host community members** (184,850 females and 1,693 persons with disabilities) and **17,969 refugees** in Bhasan Char (8,962 females, 167 persons with disabilities) accessed basic hygiene services (**68 per cent of the target in camps, 198 per cent of the target in host community and 45 per cent of the target in Bhasan Char achieved**).
- **1,245 volunteers/government staff** in camps (413 females) and **2,491 volunteers/government staff** in Bhasan Char (1,191 females) have been trained on effective WASH responses for public health emergencies (**207 per cent of the target in camps and 1,245 per cent of the target in Bhasan Char**).
- **96,729 refugees** living in camps (51,147 females, 793 persons with disabilities) and **17,359 refugees** in Bhasan Char (8,962 females, 167 people with disabilities) have benefitted from WASH interventions to promote a clean and healthy living environment for dengue prevention and control (**36 per cent of the target in camps and 111 per cent of target in Bhasan Char achieved**).
- A total of **54,844 women and girls** in Rohingya camps have been provided with Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) Kits. In Bhasan Char, **20,355 refugees** (10,355 females) now have access to water, sanitation, and hygiene supplies, including soap. Additionally, **8,313 women and girls** of reproductive age received MHM Kits.

### Nutrition

#### National Level

- **10,180 children** aged 6 to 59 months (5,137 girls) with severe acute malnutrition (SAM) were admitted for treatment in cyclone-affected areas, achieving **66 per cent** of the target.
- Additionally, **189,548 primary caregivers** of children aged 0 to 23 months benefitted from infant and young child feeding (IYCF) counselling, which is **92 per cent** of the planned target.
- In Chattogram, a multi-sectoral coordination mechanism, including nutrition, has been successfully established and is operational in Feni District, led by the Civil Surgeon's Office. A total of 3 coordination meetings have been conducted, and a Rapid Facility Assessment has been completed.

## Cox's Bazar Rohingya and Host Community

- In Cox's Bazar, **8,621 Rohingya children** (including **4,324 girls** and **219 children with disabilities**) under five (**71 per cent** of the target) received treatment for SAM. Additionally, in Bhasan Char, 236 children (including **108 girls** and **7 children with disabilities**) received SAM treatment (**26 per cent** of the target)<sup>11</sup>.
- Similarly, in Cox's Bazar, **70,037 Rohingya pregnant and lactating women (PLW)** and caregivers of children 0-23 months (**257 with disabilities**) received counselling and messaging on IYCF (**134 per cent** of the target<sup>12</sup>), while in Bhasan Char, **2,072 mothers** (**40 per cent** of the target) received similar counselling and messaging to promote optimal IYCF practices.
- In host communities, **781 children (405 girls)** with SAM and medical complications (**99 per cent of the target**) received life-saving treatment while **52,403 PLWs** (**69 with disabilities**) received IYCF counselling and messaging (**65 per cent** of the target).

## Health

### National Level

- **143,744 children** aged 0 to 11 months (**84 per cent** of the target) received the pentavalent 3 vaccine through the identification of zero dose children and additional sessions in flood and cyclone-affected areas in 2024.
- **324,274 children and women** (**63 per cent** of the target) received primary healthcare services, including antenatal care, postnatal care and integrated management of childhood illnesses, in UNICEF-supported health facilities. Efforts continue to ensure that every mother and newborn in cyclone and flood-affected areas receives quality care.
- **28,937 children and adults** (**47 per cent** of the target) were treated for dengue in UNICEF-supported health facilities. **884 healthcare providers** (**64 per cent** of the target) were trained to detect, refer, and manage dengue cases appropriately. Prevention efforts, including capacity building for service providers and public awareness activities, helped control the spread of dengue this year.
- UNICEF supported the establishment of a **20-bed acute watery diarrhoea management unit** in Feni district hospital to handle the surge in cases.
- Additionally, in order to manage cases of acute watery diarrhoea (AWD) and cholera, a total of **760,000** sachets of oral rehydration saline, **100,000** units of oral dispersible zinc tablets, and **20,000** bottles of azithromycin suspension were distributed. In the flood-affected Feni and Noakhali districts, **57,278 children** under the age of five received treatment, with **5,023** of those cases attributed to AWD.

## Cox's Bazar Rohingya and Host Community

- **92,048 children** aged 0 to 11 months received pentavalent 3 vaccine (**73 per cent** of the target), immunizing them against vaccine-preventable illnesses.
- **185,709 children and women** accessed primary healthcare in UNICEF-supported facilities (**77 per cent** of the target) and were provided with comprehensive maternal, newborn and child health services.
- **141 children and adults** were treated for dengue in UNICEF-supported health facilities (**10 per cent of the target**). Dengue prevention awareness messages have been shared with the communities during the counselling sessions in the facilities and in the house-to-house visits by the community health workers (CHWs). The numbers are significantly lower this year as Bangladesh has not experienced the same levels of the Dengue outbreak as in 2023.

## Education

### National Level

- **253,168 children (122,957 girls)** accessed formal or non-formal education, including early learning (**66 per cent** of the target). The achievement came from the Rohingya response, as the national level did not have sufficient funding to provide support for disaster response.
- **208,296 children (103,564 girls)** received individual learning materials (**32 per cent of the target**)<sup>13</sup>. Due to civil unrest and multiple disasters, the schools in specific regions, such as – Sylhet and Chittagong were closed for about 40 days<sup>14</sup>, exacerbating the already existing learning poverty in these areas.

### Cox's Bazar Rohingya and Host Community

- **253,168 children (122,957 females and 1,538 children with disabilities)** have accessed formal or non-formal education, including early learning (**99 per cent** of the target).
- **157,029 children (77,674 females and 1,029 children with disability)** have received individual learning materials (**62 per cent** of the target). The cumulative result for education remains low due to delays in textbook distribution, with many still awaiting delivery. These supplies are expected to reach students in the next reporting period.

## Child Protection, Gender Based Violence in Emergencies (GBViE)

### National Level

- In partnership with the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs (MoWCA), and the Department of Social Services (DSS), the Child Protection Programme reached **1,476,251 children and caregivers (771,460 females)**, including **29,246 persons with disabilities**, with community-based mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS) (**58 per cent** of the target).
- A total of **802,119 people (573,627 females)**, including **13,130 persons with disabilities**, have accessed gender-based violence risk mitigation, prevention and/or response interventions (**66 per cent** of the target).

### Cox's Bazar Rohingya and Host Community

- **131,772 children and caregivers (68,294 females, including 1,870 persons with disabilities)** in the Rohingya camps, **125,136 children and caregivers (64,200 females, including 398 persons with disabilities)** in the host communities, and **16,488 children and caregivers (8,655 females, including 56 persons with disabilities)** in Bhasan Char, have received Mental Health & Psychosocial Support (**83 per cent**, of the target in the Rohingya Camps, **83 per cent** of host communities, and **107 per cent** in Bhasan Char respectively) to enable them cope with different psychological issues.
- **29,539 children and caregivers (20,557 females including 156 persons with disabilities)** in the Rohingya camps, **14,440 children and caregivers (10,229 females, including 57 persons with disabilities)** in host communities, and **4,698 children and caregivers (3,547 females, including 13 persons with disabilities)** in Bhasan Char, are accessing GBV prevention, risk-mitigation, and response interventions (**82 per cent** of the target in the Rohingya Camp, **160 per cent** in host communities, and **207 per cent** in Bhasan Char respectively).
- UNICEF provided Psychological First Aid to **1,380 children (644 girls)** affected by fires, floods, and landslides caused by Cyclone Remal. **4,097 children (2,253 girls)** received psychosocial support, **54 children (31 girls)** received case management, **73 children (34 girls)** were referred to services, while **295 girls** received dignity kits.
- Amid escalating armed violence in the Rohingya camps linked to the Myanmar border conflict, UNICEF has been monitoring, reporting, and documenting grave child rights violations, while also bolstering the capacity of child protection personnel and agencies across all camps to provide essential services to affected children.

## Prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA) and Child Safeguarding

- The PSEA unit has trained **137 UNICEF staff (65 females)** and **311 staff members (148 females)** from implementing partners on PSEA and child safeguarding. UNICEF, as an active co-chair of the PSEA Network in Cox's Bazar, conducted PSEA capacity assessments for **29 civil society organizations (CSOs)** and **two international non-governmental organization (INGOs)**, all exhibiting high capacity. However, coordination challenges still remain.
- For the floods response, key messages for relevant stakeholders were shared through a cross-sectoral approach, and mandatory PSEA indicators have been integrated into all programme documents).

## Social and Behaviour Change (SBC) and Community Engagement & Accountability

### National Level

- A total of **5.4 million people**, including 2.7 million females, were reached with messaging on lifesaving behaviors and access to services across multiple emergencies, including the Rohingya crisis—achieving 311 per cent of the target. This overachievement was due to the occurrence of multiple natural disasters, such as cyclones and floods, with messages disseminated through various partners, including the Department of Mass Communication, Bangladesh Scouts, and the Bangladesh Red Crescent Society.
- Additionally, **1.7 million people (583,897 females)** were reached through messaging on prevention of heat-related illnesses during the nationwide interventions to respond to heatwaves in May 2024.
- Meanwhile, **223,850 people (125,587 females)** engaged in different community-led interventions on preventive actions to ensure safety from public health hazards such as heatwaves and dengue (**72 per cent** of the target).
- **136,428 people (79,748 females)** shared their concerns and asked questions through established mechanisms for capturing feedback and complaints (**66 per cent** of the target) in relation to accountability to affected people.

### Cox's Bazar Rohingya and Host Community

- UNICEF, through its SBC partners, engaged communities in promoting essential family and childcare practices, routine immunization, and the prevention of disease outbreaks such as dengue, acute watery diarrhoea (AWD) and Hepatitis C. In addition, they provided information on natural and man-made disasters such as cyclones, floods, landslides, and drowning in Rohingya refugee camps. A total of **512,024 individuals** were reached (**104 per cent** of the target ) through house-to-house visits, group sessions, advocacy meetings, and community consultations.
- As part of the community feedback mechanism, **14** Information and Feedback Centers (IFCs) provided crucial channels for community complaints and feedback. Through the centers, UNICEF received and referred **100,640** complaints, feedback, and queries (**57,564 from females and 2,358 from persons with disabilities**). **80 per cent** of the issues raised were successfully resolved, providing evidence of the effectiveness of the support mechanisms.
- UNICEF and its partners have concentrated efforts on community mobilization in promoting positive and protective practices, addressing harmful social norms and practices and prevention of disease outbreaks including Acute watery diarrhoea (AWD) and dengue. A total of **128,928 individuals, including 63,476 females and 1,091 persons with disabilities (103 per cent** of the target) were engaged in initiatives aimed at promoting essential family care practices, challenging harmful social norms and prevention of AWD and dengue. Special attention was given to combating protection issues such as child marriage, violence against women and children, and promotion of girls' education.
- Through four IFCs, **20,909 individuals, including 15,153 females and 214 persons with disabilities**, were referred to relevant government service facilities for further assistance and support. These efforts underscored UNICEF's commitment to fostering community resilience and addressing unique challenges faced by vulnerable and marginalized populations in host community.

### Humanitarian Cash Transfer (HCT)

- A total of **12,814 households** were reached with UNICEF-supported multi-purpose humanitarian cash transfers (HCT) across various sectors such as health and nutrition (**128 per cent** of the target).
- UNICEF has established a comprehensive database of **22,073** vulnerable households (**53,864 individuals**), including pregnant and lactating women and **914 persons with disabilities**, across 18 cyclone-prone Upazilas in 7 districts for anticipatory action and response. In addition, a database of **73,629** vulnerable households (**269,041 individuals**) in **117** flood-affected or flood-prone Upazilas in **18 districts** has been created that includes pregnant and lactating women and **2,019 persons with disabilities**.

## Humanitarian Leadership, Coordination and Strategy

The Government of Bangladesh leads the Rohingya humanitarian response in Cox's Bazar and Bhasan Char. The National Task Force chaired by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Bangladesh provides oversight and overall strategic guidance for humanitarian response. In addition, the National Committee on Coordination, Management and Law and Order, led by the Ministry of Home Affairs (MoHA), was formed in December 2020. The Office of Refugee Relief and Repatriation Commissioner (RRRC) manages and provides oversight for day-to-day operations under the Ministry of Disaster Management & Relief (MoDMR). The Deputy Commissioner (DC) leads the civil administration and coordinates the responses to address the needs of Bangladeshi communities during disasters, and ensures security and public order. UNICEF leads the Nutrition and WASH Sectors and Child Protection Sub-Sector, and co-leads the Education Sector with Save the Children in Cox's Bazar's Rohingya response and WASH and Education sectors in Bhasan Char, in coordination with the RRRC and the relevant government departments such as Department of primary and Mass Education (DPME), department of Public health and Engineering (DPHE), Department of Social Services (DSS) and others. UNICEF is a core member of the Emergency Preparedness and Response Working Group (EPRWG), and Humanitarian Access Working Group (HAWG), which functions under the Inter Sector Coordination Group (ISCG). UNICEF also actively participates in the Disaster Risk Reduction Working Group (DRRWG) under the Office of the District Commissioner.

UNICEF is one of the Strategic Executive Group (SEG) members with other UN agencies. The SEG provides overall guidance for the Rohingya humanitarian response and engages with the Government of Bangladesh at the national level. At the field level in Cox's Bazar, the ISCG Secretariat ensures the overall coordination of the response. The ISCG Principal Coordinator chairs the Refugee Operations and Coordination Team (ROCT), which brings together the Heads of operational UN Agencies, members of the international and national non-governmental organizations (NGOs), and donor representatives based in Cox's Bazar. The ISCG convenes the Inter-Sector Meeting to ensure intersectoral coordination in the response. The SEG Co-Chairs are leading a process to streamline the coordination system in Cox's Bazar that will be implemented in 2024. In 2022, the humanitarian community finalized a set of 'Principles of Rationalization' that aim to ensure that all Rohingya refugees have equitable access to all basic services in a predictable, efficient, and timely manner and that the humanitarian community is transparent and accountable in its interventions. This exercise has informed the JRP 2024 and will continue to be applied in the coming years.

UN Women, UNFPA, and UNICEF collaborate through the Gender in Humanitarian Action (GiHA), GBV Cluster, and Child Protection Cluster, sharing strategies, assessing tools, and implementing approaches to ensure the immediate safety and protection of women and girls in shelters. This collaboration aims to secure shelters and facilities against gender-based violence. Leveraging the AAP training conducted in the first half of 2024, UNICEF SBC section continued to co-lead the national AAP Working Group (AAP WG) of the Inter-Cluster Coordination Group (ICCG) together with the BBC Media Action, and also led AAP WG in the area-based inter-agency coordination system introduced for the flood response in Feni, Noakhali, Lakshmipur, and Cumilla districts in Chattogram Division.

At the national level, the Inter-Cluster Coordination Group, under the Humanitarian Coordination Task Team, meets regularly to align its efforts with the Government of Bangladesh's response to the floods and Cyclone Remal. The UNRCO has updated the Humanitarian Response Plan (HRP) to incorporate the recent flash floods in north- and south-eastern Bangladesh. The five most affected districts—Noakhali, Feni, Laxmipur, Cumilla, and Khagrachhari—was included, with a total population in need (PIN) of 1.8 million people, representing 30% of the affected population. The targeted number of people for assistance is over 942,000, with a financial requirement of US\$71 million. The HRP will remain adaptable, with goals and resources modified as necessary to prioritize the most affected populations and areas.

In order to strengthen coordination of the eastern floods response, UNICEF, in response to a request from the UNRC, seconded one staff to support the government in establishing area-based coordination structures in the affected areas as part of systems strengthening initiative.

## Human Interest Stories and External Media

UNICEF developed communication and advocacy content, such as press releases, human interest stories, social media messaging, and multimedia assets to raise awareness on and encouraging continued support to respond to all six key programmatic areas<sup>15</sup> of responses for Rohingya and Bangladeshi children and communities, highlighted through the UNICEF Bangladesh website and social media channels. UNICEF Bangladesh is leading among all Country Offices globally in terms of digital media outreach, with over 12 million social media followers.
