Humanitarian Situation Report No. 4



Highlights

- Burkina Faso registered 62 security incidents in May, causing 81 civilian casualties, including one child. Notwithstanding the increase in the number of incidents, the number of casualties decreased significantly, from 153 killed between January and April to 62 deaths in May (UNICEF Security)
- The number of internally displaced persons (IDPs) reached 848,329 ([CONASUR, 22 April 2020](#)), out of which 61 percent were children. According to the same report, 22 per cent of the IDPs live in host families.
- On [9 March](#), the first case of COVID-19 was confirmed in the country, reaching 881 cases by the end of May (Ministry of Health - MoH [Sitrep #93](#)).
- The schools remained closed in May. Meanwhile, the Ministry of national education, literacy and promotion of national languages (MENAPNLN) prepared [a series of measures](#) before the next reopening of schools. Overall, these measures include the reopening of exam classes scheduled for 1st June and the establishment of recommendations related to schools reopening for the current [school calendar](#) and the validation [guidelines](#) for the 2019-2020 school year.

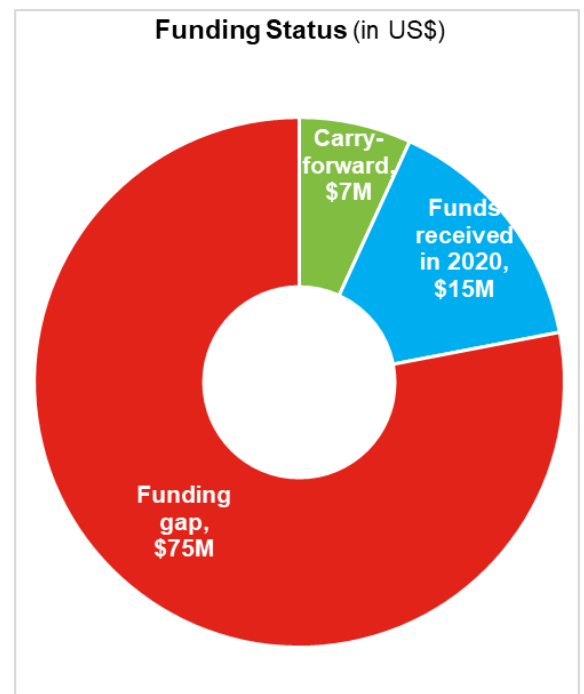
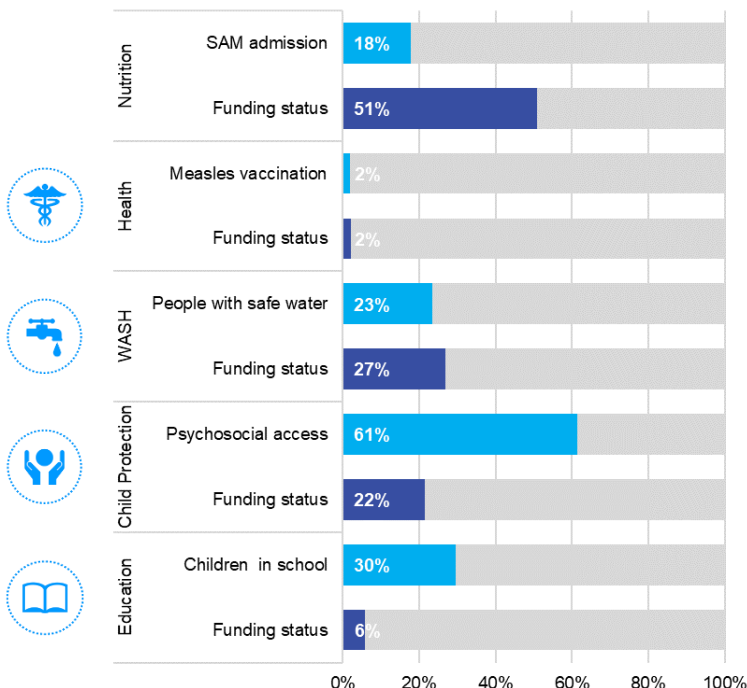

UNICEF's Response and Funding Status

Funding Overview and Partnerships

In line with the 2020 UNICEF [Humanitarian Action for Children appeal](#) (HAC), the funding gap at the end of May 2020 was US\$75.4 million (78 per cent). During the reporting period, UNICEF-Burkina Faso received US\$374,009 from OCHA-CERF. UNICEF Burkina Faso would like to recognize this generous contribution, as well as those of other key partners who have contributed US\$14.5 million in 2020¹ and US\$6.6 million in 2019 to the HAC 2020². UNICEF also recognizes the flexible and unearmarked funding received in 2020 from the Global Humanitarian Thematic Fund³.

Situation Overview & Humanitarian Needs

According to the [Humanitarian Needs Overview 2020](#), an estimated 948,000 people are in need of protection and 2.2 million people are dependent on humanitarian assistance in Burkina Faso. The country is severely affected by a humanitarian crisis due to insecurity. Attacks by non-state armed groups (NSAG) dramatically increased in 2019 and maintained the same pace in the first months of 2020, with more civilians being targeted or threatened. Consequently, new waves of displacements took place in several regions. Registration of new IDPs is regularly conducted by the *Conseil national de secours d'urgence et de rehabilitation* (CONASUR), the government institution in charge of data collection and humanitarian response. As of [22 April](#), 848,329 IDPs had been registered in the country, including 516,642 children (61 per cent). Centre-Nord and Sahel remain the regions hosting the highest percentage of displaced populations (46 and 37 per cent respectively). The Nord region has registered a major increase in the number of displaced population, from 42,396 in February to 66,659 in April (+57 per cent).

As of [13 April](#), 133 out of 1,140 health centres (12 per cent) in six emergency-affected regions were closed. An estimated 1,596,233 have no/or limited access to nutrition and health services. The Sahel region continues to register the highest number of health centres closed, 72 out of 119 (60 per cent).

As of [10 March](#), 2,512 schools were closed depriving 349,909 children of their rights to education and affecting 11,219 teachers.

On [9 March](#), the government of Burkina Faso declared the COVID-19 epidemic in a context of ongoing humanitarian crisis with increasing population displacements due to insecurity. As of [31 May](#), the MoH confirmed 881 cases of COVID-19 (322 females et 559 males) and 53 deaths in 9 out of the 13 regions of the country, including 2 out of the 5 regions affected by insecurity. 3 regions Boucle du Mouhoun, Centre and Hauts-Bassins regions, out of the 9 affected by COVID-19 still have active cases. 9 out of 22 districts affected by COVID-19 still have active cases. The average age of confirmed cases is 43,9 years (standard deviation 17,6 years) and 64,5 years for deaths (standard deviation: 16,9 years). The government has put in place several measures to prevent the spreading of epidemics, such as the shutdown of the country's borders, the closure of schools and, the interdiction of all activities grouping more than 50 people. Notwithstanding the containment measures, humanitarian actors, including UNICEF, took immediate action⁴ to mitigate the impact on the ongoing humanitarian response, to increase the coverage of services and to allow the continuity of humanitarian interventions. The lifting of the curfew and of the internal travel ban allowed UNICEF and partners to accelerate the implementation of the humanitarian response.

Summary Analysis of Programme Response

Nutrition

In May 2020, 32,529 children aged 6 to 59 months suffering from severe acute malnutrition (SAM) were admitted into therapeutic feeding programmes. This represents an increase of 4,817 SAM children compared to April 2020.

In terms of Infant and young child feeding (IYCF) promotion and support, 19,288 mother-to-mother support groups (out of 19,159 in April) were set up. Since January, 277,901 pregnant and lactating women have benefited from monthly counselling services on optimal IYCF practices in emergencies, compared to 264,587 as of end of April.

Awareness activities also integrated essential information from community leaders and children to protect themselves from contamination.

Complementary feeding with micronutrient powders was provided to 10,436 children from 6 to 23 months, including 5,504 girls and 4,932 boys.

Nutrition cluster

In 2020, UNICEF is supporting the integration of prevention and treatment of malnutrition in Sahel region. In April and May 2020, a delay in the implementation of nutrition activities was noted since partners had to integrate COVID-19 protection measures to their programmes. The NGOs Alima, MDM France and MSF Spain are implementing simplified protocol⁵, for the prevention and management of acute malnutrition in the health districts of Barsalogho, Kongoussi in the Centre-Nord region and Sebba in the Sahel region, where most of health facilities are closed.

In May, following the 2020 simplified protocol⁶, 167 out of 209 community-based health workers (CBHW) and 2,816 persons were trained on malnutrition screening and case referral in five health areas of Barsalogho, and 8,801 mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) tapes were distributed.

In June 2020, 22 non-governmental organizations (NGO) implemented nutrition programs in the five priority regions affected by humanitarian situation, compared to 17 in January. The cluster meetings constitute an effective forum to harmonize the interventions, ensure complementarity and avoid duplications.

Given the persisting access challenge and the need to have a comprehensive nutrition response, the nutrition cluster is working with the wash, food security and health clusters to develop an integrated package for emergency response. A WASH in nutrition strategy is being finalized by a joint team under the coordination of the nutrition directorate at the MoH.

COVID Adaptation

In line with [the guidelines for wasting management](#), promotion and support of IYCF in the context of COVID-19, UNICEF and its partners started the training of health workers and CBHWs on the prevention and control of COVID-19 infection. A total of 2,218 CBHWs and 1,640 mothers leaders had been trained on COVID19 prevention.

2,388 hand washing kits were distributed to 2,388 mother-to-mother support groups in Centre-Nord region, and 2,218 masks were donated to CBHWs and to 1,640 mothers leaders during animations and community dialogues.

Ongoing partnership agreements with NGOs were amended to include COVID-19 prevention measures⁷. The [revision of the](#) Integrated phases classification (IPC) of acute malnutrition and food security in COVID 19 context was done in May. Preliminary results show that from January to May, the situation deteriorated from phase 2 to phase 3 in 6 provinces⁸, and 23 provinces remained stable (without phase change), including 4 which remain in critical phase⁹. 2,151,970 people (11,75 per cent more than the 1,786,629 previously estimated) will be in immediate need of food assistance for the projected phase from June to October 2020.

Due to the integration of COVID-19 protection measures, including the distribution of handwashing kits and masks, and the briefing of CBHWs, a delay of one month was registered in the preparations of the first round of vitamin A supplementation, deworming and screening of acute malnutrition for 3,289,192 children, 6-59 months. The campaign is now planned for 28 June 2020 nationwide. The main constraint for the campaign remains the access in insecure areas such as Soum and Djibo provinces (Sahel Region) and Foubé commune (Centre Nord region).

Health

In regions where health facilities are closed or are operating at a minimum because of the security situation¹⁰, community-based interventions strengthened the offer of health services to the population.

In May, the following results were achieved through community-based interventions:

In the Centre-Nord region

- 1,283 children under the age of 5 were treated, according to the national Health information system (Endos), through the integrated community case management (iCCM) strategy, including 342 malaria cases, 352 diarrhea cases and 502 pneumonia cases (with 210 referrals), and 87 children were referred to health centres for nutritional care.
- 4,873 people were reached with messages on essential family practices in the health district of Barsalogo.
- 5,000 newborn kits¹¹ were distributed in the health district of Barsalogo, Centre-Nord region and Djibo, Sahel region. 2,440 IDPs received an Interagency emergency health kit (IEHK 2017)¹² in Foubé, in the Barsalogo health district.
- In Sahel and Centre-Nord regions, 9,000 mosquito nets for malaria prevention were distributed to displaced populations.

COVID adaptation

The situation of COVID-19 calls for continuous adjustments of UNICEF's response on the ground, particularly for the implementation of activities which require population regrouping such as community-based activities and vaccination. Protection measures against COVID-19 were integrated in all activities.

WASH

In May 2020, UNICEF and its implementing partners provided access to water to 29,443 people and sanitation services to 4,152 people. In addition, 64,881 people have improved their hygiene conditions thanks to the distribution of [hygiene kits](#)¹³ and hygiene promotion campaigns. The progress rate towards annual targets is 23 per cent for water, 5 per cent for sanitation and 27 per cent for hygiene.

The following activities were implemented in May : distribution of 9,600 m³ of water through water trucking; rehabilitation of 9 boreholes with hand pumps; installation of 2 water tanks on Koium Kouli IDPs site in Kaya for 1,333 people; installation of 8 water solar systems; construction 276 household latrines; distribution of dignity kits¹⁴ for 744 women and girls.

As part of the implementation of the [Summer plan](#)¹⁵, UNICEF and its implementing partners rehabilitated 31 boreholes with hand pumps and installed 8 water solar systems in the Sahel region.

WASH cluster

In May 2020, WASH cluster members, led by UNICEF, provided access to water services to 44,967 people, to sanitation services to 11,661 people and improved hygiene conditions with the distribution of [hygiene kits](#) and hygiene promotion campaigns to 97,375 people. Retroactive reporting of some WASH cluster members regarding the results obtained in previous months explains the different data in the Annex 1.

The progress rate towards annual targets is 19 percent for water, 9 percent for sanitation and 25 percent for hygiene. The data reported refer to the 21 members of the cluster, not only to the organizations which have projects registered in the [HRP](#) (14 organizations). The progress towards the targets is slow but has significantly improved since March.

While the sector funding situation is improving, the gap for the WASH sector is still high and represents one of the main challenges in the progress towards targets, together with insufficient capacity of the sector stakeholders to face the gravity of the crises and the rapidly increasing needs.

COVID-19 ADAPTATION

COVID-19 has contributed to slowing down the performance rate of partners as they have reoriented their efforts from humanitarian response to the conflict towards COVID-19 fund-raising and response. Cluster coordination efforts in

May have been dedicated to COVID-19 preparedness and response and the development of the COVID-19 addendum to HRP.

Education

In May, no schools were opened in Burkina Faso, in line with the ad hoc measure taken by the government since 16 March due to the COVID-19¹⁶. To support continuous learning UNICEF, via its partner *Centre Diocésain de Communication* (CDC), launched the Radio education programme (REP)¹⁷ in the Nord and Centre-Nord regions. As of May, the results in terms of access to distance/home-based learning via radio remained 94,683 school-aged children¹⁸ (49,235 girls).

In addition, UNICEF in Burkina Faso is piloting the "Koranic schools/spaces"/"Foyers coraniques" initiative as an opportunity to promote peace education, skills for life, peace building and to prevent radicalization of young people in Sahel region. In 2020, 12 Koranic schools/spaces are supported to provide adolescents and young people with the ability to challenge negative/subjective information. This initiative is also a great opportunity for UNICEF to strengthen the integrated and multi-sectoral programming approach in Sahel region.

Other activities included ongoing awareness-raising sessions for 43,519 displaced communities and host families on gender-based violence (GBV) in domestic settings, the importance of continuous learning and social cohesion during the COVID-19 pandemic.

COVID-19 ADAPTATION

In May, the distance/home-based learning programme via radio was UNICEF's main COVID-19 adaptation for educational continuity. Other COVID-19 adaptation measures include physical distance (1 meter) between participants in training sessions or awareness-raising campaigns.

Child Protection

In May, UNICEF continued its strategic advocacy and engagement with relevant government entities for the adoption of the handover protocol of children encountered during armed conflict in Burkina Faso. UNICEF is supporting child protection partners to implement preventative actions and to provide child protection humanitarian services and care for child survivors of violence, including grave child rights violations.

UNICEF is contributing to the efforts of social service departments at commune and municipality levels to expand and strengthen their workforce, especially para-social workers, in a bid to support community-based child protection mechanisms for the prevention and response to the need of children and families affected by the crisis.

- UNICEF and its partners reached 19,219 new children (10,163 girls). A total of 133,786 children have been provided with appropriate child protection services since January, representing 68 per cent of its annual target of 197,304 children affected by the emergency.
- UNICEF and child protection area of responsibility (CPAoR) partners reached 20,874 new children (10,959 girls) and 190 children (93 girls) living with disabilities with child protection services, such as psychosocial support in response to distress.
- UNICEF finalised four new partnerships with four implementing partners¹⁹ to accelerate and scale-up psychosocial and other services for children.
- UNICEF and its partners provided child protection **services such as psychosocial support, medical care, and referral to other services (such as legal assistance, non-food items (NFI), family mediation and reintegration)** to 439 children (207 girls) with specific needs (victims of exploitation, sexual abuse, physical or moral violence) using the case management approach, and 14 new children (8 girls) were identified and referred to service providers.
- 1,559 children (752 girls), from 120 vulnerable families benefited from non-food items. Through focus groups activities, 5,642 people, including 3,176 girls and women, benefited from key messages on GBV and prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse (PSEA).
- 29 separated children (**15 girls**) benefited from family tracing and reunification services in several communes. 8 unaccompanied new children (4 girls) were identified and referred to family tracing and reunification services.

- 18,636 people (10,710 women) were reached by awareness raising sessions on the prevention of family separation and violence against children in emergency.

COVID-19 ADAPTATION

In May 2020, UNICEF and partners continued to work on COVID-19 prevention and on the provision of services to children and families affected by the pandemic with specific attention to measures to protect field personnel that are directly working with children, measures to protect children during the provision of mental health and psychosocial support activities and outreach activities in communities hosting IDPs, including host communities.

46 additional staff from implementing partners were trained on adaptation and preventive measures to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, including community engagement in the response and key messages on GBV, prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse (PSEA) and other forms of violence against children.

CPAoR conducted an assessment on needs of children and families in the context of COVID-19. The results of this assessment will allow child protection actors to respond by targeting specific needs of children, families and communities.

Communications for Development (C4D), Community Engagement & Accountability

UNICEF continued providing technical support alongside OCHA and other humanitarian organizations, to the interagency Community engagement and accountability to affected populations (CEAAP) working group. UNICEF also extended its partnership with *Action communautaire pour le développement* (ACD) and regional directorates of health, humanitarian affairs, WASH and education to reinforce field interventions to engage affected communities in the humanitarian response.

UNICEF led radio programmes, including discussions, live dialogues sessions, radio theatres and games, have reached over 900,000 people (including 3,500 living disabilities) through 10 radio stations mainly in the Centre-Nord region. Lifesaving messages and practices were focused on:

- Access of IDPs to water points, toilets in households and public places, hygiene and management of menstrual hygiene
- Utilization of health services, immunization, breastfeeding, malaria and COVID-19 related messages
- Restart of school in a context of COVID-19 pandemic and the new calendar to end the school year
- Registration of IDPs and entitlements of affected people.

UNICEF and its partner ACD started a series of community dialogues and 19 interactive radio programmes as part of community feedback and participation in the Centre-Nord region, the hotspot of the humanitarian crisis. These two activities allowed two-way communication and dialogue on the role of affected communities in the humanitarian response, and the humanitarian principles and accountability of humanitarian organizations to affected populations.

Following a radio-based feedback programme during which IDPs and host communities questioned authorities about the assistance, the regional humanitarian director took some actions to reorient and improve IDPs registration and information. During the reporting period, 40 community dialogues were carried out in 40 affected villages on the humanitarian assistance and social cohesion.

The dialogues led to the following results:

- Over 1,000 community leaders, including IDPs, traditional chiefs, Muslim and Christian leaders, women, young people and village advisors were involved in dialogues on peace promotion and social cohesion
- 240 community leaders are engaged to take actions to promote peace and social cohesion in their community
- In some places of Kaya municipality, Centre-Nord region, community consultations were led by community members, including IDPs, to facilitate IDPs access to water points and sources
- Traditional and religious leaders, and members of their community, are taking actions to facilitate the access by IDPs to latrines of mosques, churches and over public places.

COVID-19 ADAPTATION

UNICEF continued providing support to the coordination, capacity building and field interventions of Risk communication and community engagement (RCCE) in the response to COVID-19. UNICEF and partners have integrated COVID-19 messages in ongoing social and behavior change interventions, including radio programmes and activities at community level. As of 31 May 2020, UNICEF-led RCCE interventions, in collaboration with these partners,

implementing partners (regional health directorates of Boucle du Mouhoun, Sahel and Hauts-Bassins, MoH, National Volunteer Programme and Ministry of communication), have directly reached over 861,970 people through interpersonal communication while mass media interventions, including radio, TV programmes and jingles, have reached 6,5 million people with messages on prevention against COVID-19.

Media and external communication

The media and external communication team reached out to media to raise awareness of the humanitarian situation and response. The team responded to special requests from international media, including a feature report of the German TV [ZDF](#) that includes the interview of the Chief of the Zone Office of Kaya on the implementation of humanitarian activities in times of COVID-19. The thematic of the continuity of humanitarian delivery was reported on social media Facebook [here](#), [here](#) and [here](#), Twitter [here](#), [here](#) and Instagram [here](#), [here](#), [here](#) and [here](#).

UNICEF also amplified the [press release](#) issued by the Regional Office focusing on the need of protection of children in Sahel by outreaching media including [France Info](#) and [Burkina Info](#) among otherq, and posted key information on social media Facebook [here](#) and [here](#), Twitter [here](#) and [here](#), and [here](#), Instagram [here](#).

UNICEF produced a [video](#) emphasizing the activities to fight malnutrition and published it on [Twitter](#) as well.

Humanitarian Leadership, Coordination, and Strategy

In 2020, UNICEF Burkina Faso aims at addressing the most urgent needs of 1.5 million people, including 690,000 vulnerable children, affected by humanitarian crisis in the five most affected regions by scaling up its response to emergencies while strengthening social cohesion and resilience as a mid-term strategy. The bottom line is to ensure continuity and high coverage of services to children and families in crisis-affected regions, in accordance with HAC and Core Commitments for Children (CCC) procedures and standards. UNICEF supports community-based interventions in areas where the government suspended basic social services or where insecurity severely restricted access to the most vulnerable populations. This action is seen as an opportunity to strengthen the involvement of communities and local authorities in co-creating solutions to issues affecting children and families, and to showcase the development-humanitarian-peace nexus. In addition, UNICEF Burkina Faso has established and operationalized a cash transfer task force to strengthen the coordination and integration between emergency and development programmes. As a result, an HPD will be signed with Red Cross Burkina Faso to start the cash transfer to 4000 vulnerable households in 2 targeted communes between July and August 2020 (humanitarian response); and 1117 vulnerable households out of 3917 will receive the first transfer in June (social protection policy/development programme). More details will be shared in the next SitRep.

With the drastic increase in IDPs, UNICEF increased its presence by setting up field offices in Dori (Sahel region) and Kaya (Centre-Nord region), and since mid-February, in Fada N'Gourma (Est region). UNICEF is the lead agency for the WASH, nutrition, education clusters and child protection area of responsibility (CPAoR). UNICEF is also strengthening the coordination and information management capacities of the clusters through the recruitment of dedicated specialists at national and subnational levels.

COVID-19 ADAPTATION

Following the COVID-19 outbreak in Burkina Faso, an inter-ministerial National coordinating committee (NCC) was set up under the lead of the MoH, for the planning, coordination, implementation and monitoring of COVID-19 preparedness and response. The NCC includes all the financial and technical partners. For cohesion purpose and rational use of available technical resources, the members of the health cluster are also members of this coordination mechanism.

UNICEF participates in four commissions established by the government to design, implement, monitor and coordinate the response to COVID-19:

- Coordination commission, where UNICEF plays a key role in the design of government response to COVID-19
- Case management commission, which holds daily meetings to assess the situation of new cases, challenges related to tests and treatments of those who are already infected

- Logistics commission, where UNICEF is providing support for the procurement of oxygen concentrators, protection masks, gloves of protection (covering 10% of the national needs), resuscitation devices, and hand sanitizer (gel)
- Risk communication and community engagement commission, where UNICEF is the co-lead with the MoH, to develop key messages to raise public awareness on the prevention of COVID-19. UNICEF also publishes press releases about the epidemic in Burkina Faso.
