## Humanitarian Situation Report No. 10

for every child

### Highlights

- Non-state armed groups continue to maintain constant pressure on security forces and civilians by carrying out repeated attacks, without necessarily resulting in mass casualties. Humanitarian operators and NGOs remain an interesting target of opportunity for extremist and criminal non-state armed groups, especially in Tillabéri and Diffa regions.
- Due to security constraints and governmental restrictions mainly in Tillaberi Region on access since October, RRM response have been stopped. About 8,400 people for 1,700 households have been deprived of assistance since the imposition of humanitarian escorts.
- As of October 24, 33 506 people were affected by the flooding, following intense rain in October in Diffa region. UNICEF have provided drugs, education kits, water trucking and NFI. In addition, a Small-Scale Funding Agreement (SSFA) have been signed with the Nigerien Red Cross (NRC) for two months. This multisectoral project will be focused on sensitization and distribution of health, WASH and nutrition items. About 15,000 children will benefit from these activities.
- A vaccination campaign against Polio coupled with vitamin A was held in October, targeting 3,110,700 children aged 0-59 months in 32 health districts. A total of 3,314,362 children were vaccinated, this represents a coverage of 107%.

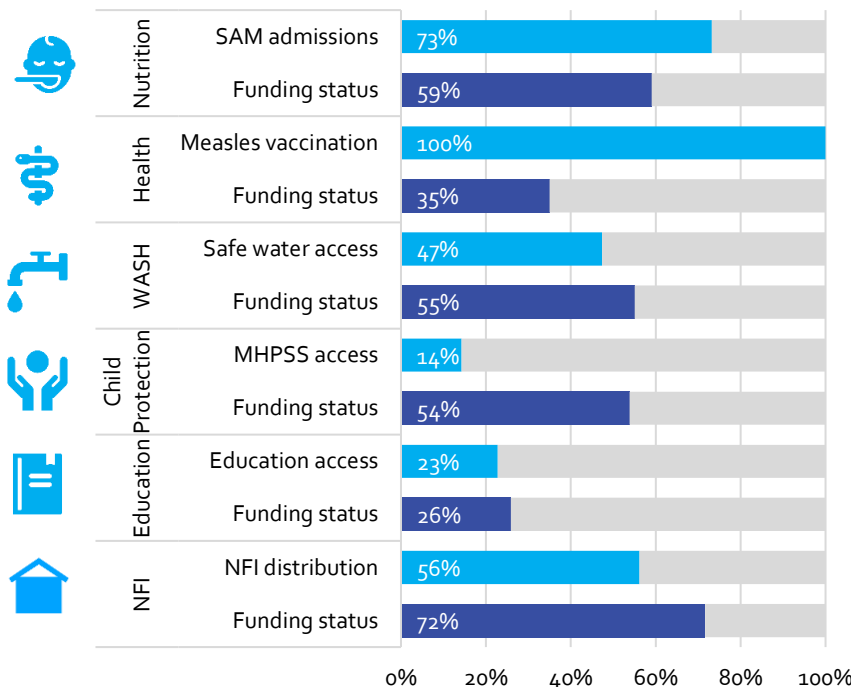

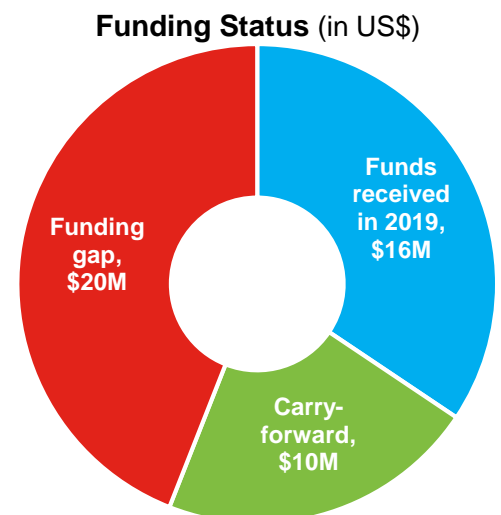

## Funding Overview and Partnership

UNICEF appeals for US\$ 45.9M to sustain provision of life-saving services for women and children. UNICEF expresses its sincere gratitude to all public and private donors for the contributions received. However, the 2019 HAC still has a funding gap of 44%. Without sufficient funding, over 80,000 girls and boys aged 4 to 17 years affected by crisis will not receive learning materials and more than 20,000 children will not receive the psychosocial support they need.

## Situation Overview & Humanitarian Needs

**Humanitarian Needs Overview, Response Plan, and 2020 outlook:** After the finalization of HNO/HRP narratives, HPC 2020 move into a phase of project submission on Projects Module Platform. UNICEF will submit 09 projects in the area of WASH, Education, RRM and Child Protection. Project Module includes all the projects that are part of the Humanitarian Response Plan (HRP) and remain one of the funding tools of the HPC.

**Tillabéri and Tahoua:** Access remains very limited due to continuous insecurity, a cumbersome civil-military coordination process and frequent cancellations of trip approvals due to incidents and reports of armed group activity. Lack of access is slowing down program delivery (e.g. for IDPs under the ongoing CERF funding). Reports indicate that increasingly, schools are being targeted by non-state armed actors, with threats made against teachers and parents.

**Floods:** Floods continue across the country, and the government is asking the humanitarian community for assistance in wash, food and non-food items / shelter. UNICEF has delivered additional KOBO training sessions to the civil protection department to speed up and digitalize their needs assessments. The Wash section is activating standby PCAs to speed up the response.

## Summary Analysis of Programme Response

### Nutrition

UNICEF, in close collaboration with the Ministry of Health and respective regional and health districts, supported the treatment of SAM children nationwide.

#### Lake Chad Basin crisis

As of 20th of October (week 42), 10,352 under-five children suffering from SAM were admitted for treatment in Diffa region, including 876 cases with medical complications. This represents 66.2% of the annual target. Compared to the same period last year (week 1 to 42), a decrease of 14% and 18% was observed in inpatient and outpatient facilities respectively.

#### Mali Border crisis (Tahoua and Tillabéri regions)

As of 20th of October (week 42), 75,837 under-five children suffering from SAM were admitted for treatment in Tahoua and Tillabéri regions, including 9,785 cases with medical complications. This represents 70.2% of the annual target. Compared to the same period last year (week 1 to 42), an increase of admissions of 12.3% was observed in outpatient care while a decrease of 12.2% was observed in inpatient facilities.

#### National crisis

As of 20th of October (week 42), 278,355 under-five children suffering from SAM were admitted for treatment. Among these children, 34,487 cases (11.8%) presented medical complications. This represents 73.2% of the annual target. Compared to the same period last year (week 1-42), an increase of admissions of 5% was observed in outpatient care while a decrease of 14% was observed in inpatient facilities.

### Health

At the end of October 2019, epidemiological surveillance data included a total of 223 measles cases and 0 death, 14 cases of meningitis with 1 death, 38 cases of Acute Flaccid Paralysis (AFP), and 72,487 cases of malaria with 17 deaths. For measles, this represents 17 % increase compared to last year at the same time.

In response to the flood crisis in the Diffa region which led to significant population displacement, UNICEF provided support by sending tents to supplement the flooded health facilities, mosquito nets and medics to strengthen community care.

UNICEF continue to support iCCM intervention at Health District level. 2,119 children between 6-59 months old were treated for fever, diarrhoea, and malaria by health community workers in Diffa and N'Guigmi Health District. However, iCCM data are not transmitted in time, and there is a long delay of iCCM data feedback due to the distance of the community relays.

Immunization activities are planned to take place in November; 320 000 vaccines were received to organize Poliovirus Vaccination Campaign in November. The fourth round of the seasonal malaria chemoprophylaxis campaign were carried out during October for host and refugee populations in Diffa region.

## WASH

### Lake Chad Basin crisis

Since January 2019, the WASH Cluster actors have supported 21,098 people to gain access to sustainable water sources from which 18,259 people with UNICEF support. This include 13,859 people reached this month with the completion of a piped potable water system supply in Awaridi village supported by UNICEF.

Related to hygiene and sanitation, a total of 53,872 people was reached since January 2019 by the WASH Cluster actors including 12,916 people with UNICEF support. The ongoing implementation of CLTS in Chetimari and Foulatari by the NGO ADESA since August and of emergency sanitation and hygiene promotion activities in IDPs sites of Kitchendi and Awaridi by the NGO DEMI E both with UNICEF support and targeting a total of 13,545 people will enable to meet UNICEF targets related to sanitation.

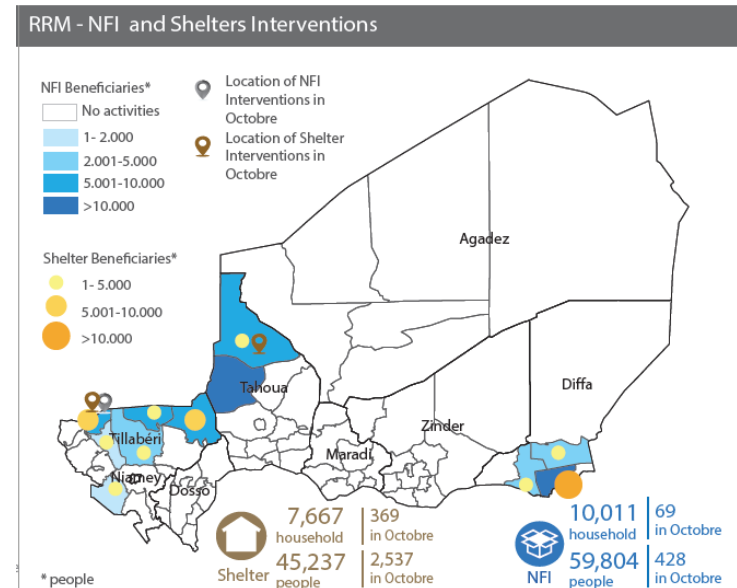
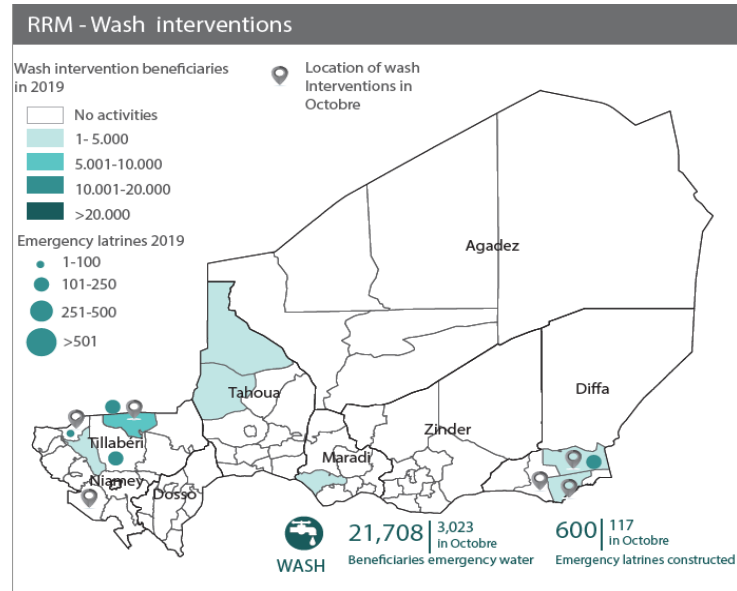
### Mali border crisis (Tahoua and Tillabéri regions)

In October, 4,459 people gained access to emergency water supply with UNICEF support, resulting in 46,160 people overall gaining access to emergency water supply through the WASH Cluster response since January 2019 against a target of 10,000. Besides, 11,756 people gained access to hygiene kit and sensitization this month, which raised the total result to 114,861 people with UNICEF support since January 2019. Related to sanitation, 1,928 people were reached with sanitation facilities in in October rising to a total of 27,167 people reached since January with UNICEF support.

### Other crises

In Maradi region, the implementation of CLTS in 15 villages hosting 15,195 Nigerian refugees by the NGO CISP with UNICEF support since early September is ongoing.

Moreover, with a new water tower established at Garin Kaka village by UNHCR, 3,000 refugees and 1,000 host communities gained access to sustainable drinking water this month.



## Education

Attacks against education are continuing through the country. At the end of October, there were 101 schools closed in Tillabéri region for a total of 6,016 students (2,882 girls) affected by school closure, in Diffa 3 schools and 636 students affected (380 girls), and in Maradi one school with 28 students affected.

### Lake Chad Basin crisis

#### Access

In the Diffa region, UNICEF and its partners (COOPI International, CONCERN Worldwide, Plan International) have carried out intensive community mobilization actions since the start of the school year. A total of 12,277 students, including 6,461 girls, have returned to school and continue their education in host and emergency schools as well as in alternative education centers. Among those students, 3,912 (2,111 girls) were newly enrolled students.

**Quality:** In October 2019, NGO CONCERN distributed school kits to 2640 students (including 1,346 girls) while 400 preschool children received educational materials with the support of UNICEF. NGO CONCERN trained for five days 94 teachers (including 43 women and 10 pedagogical supervisors) on the rapid learning technique for reading.

The Regional Directorate for Primary Education (DREP) with the support of UNICEF trained for 2 days, 83 school directors (including 42 women) and 45 pedagogical supervisors (including one woman) on RapidPro tool. In addition, the DREP and the Cluster organized a two-day capacity-building workshop for senior management and emergency coordination on education planning in emergency. This training involved inspectors of primary and secondary education, vocational training, the members of civil society and of the committees of decentralized management of schools (CGDES) and officials of the governorate.

4,600 students including 2,346 girls affected by crisis are attending lessons in 46 classrooms where the teachers have been trained in psychosocial support and 82 secondary schools dispose Conflict and Disaster Risk Reduction (CDRR) plans.

Plan International, which is an education Cluster member, organized a training session for bridge center facilitators and foster school teachers on CDRR, child protection and VBG concepts for 16 people, including 8 women, and distributed the solar lamps for learners at gateway centers in Chetimari and N'Guigmi for 200 children (113 girls).

#### **Mali Border crisis (Tahoua and Tillabéri regions)**

**Access:** CONCERN, with the support of UNICEF on CERF funds, has carried out mobilization activities on the importance of education in the Tillabéri region. Thanks to this social mobilization activity, 4,079 out of school children (1,994 girls) have been enrolled by their parents in host schools which received also temporary classrooms and school materials. With UNICEF funding, NGO Swisscontact has trained 101 teenagers (out school children), including 75 girls on trade in Tillabéri. This training gives them the opportunity to continue their studies in official vocational training centers. In the town of Tillia, 70 displaced out school children were able to register in an emergency school created by the municipality on the site of the displaced thanks to the sensitization carried out by NGO COOPI on CERF funding.

**Quality:** On CERF funding, COOPI trained 191 teachers on cross-cutting topics (GBV, child protection and mine risk education), as well as 276 members (132 women) of the school management committees from 46 schools on education for peace and violence prevention in schools. 13,450 students including 6,456 girls accessing to education with those trained teachers. It should be noted that the 269 teachers, including 125 women, were trained during school holidays by NGOs CONCERN and COOPI.

NGO Save the Children organized a training session on the teaching of national languages, French and mathematics for 8 facilitators (7 women). The training focused on teaching techniques and tools in bridging classes. World Vision has distributed textbooks/school books for 1,026 children, including 535 girls at CI, CP, CE1 levels in Tahoua.

#### **National crisis**

**Access:** UNICEF provides tents and school supplies for schools damaged by floods in Agadez, Diffa, etc. 32 TLS have been set up and have enabled 1,585 students (853 girls), to continue their education.

In Agadez, ONG INTERSOS with the support of UNICEF integrated 90 asylum seeker children (45 girls) to public schools in the nearby community.

**Quality:** In Diffa following the floods, 945 students benefited from school materials, including 534 girls, thanks to the support of UNICEF. The 90 asylum-seeker children integrated into the schools of the municipality of Agadez also benefited from school materials.

### **Child Protection**

#### **Lake Chad Basin crisis**

In October, the activities taking place in the region of Diffa which has been affected by floods from the Komadougou river, resulting in over 19 000 children needing psychosocial support. Child protection actors were rapidly positioned in five sites to offer basic services to affected children. Twenty-four (24) community-based members (24) were trained on child protection and can identify vulnerable children in their communities and refer them to the adequate structures and respond to any kind of emergency.

#### **Mali border crisis (Tahoua and Tillabéri regions)**

At the Mali and Burkina Faso border, UNICEF partners have been able to set up 15 child friendly spaces in the Ayerou, Abala and Tillia departments while 11 child protection community-based mechanisms were set up or reinforced. Activities were disrupted by the security situation and access to certain localities. Nevertheless, 103 vulnerable children were identified and referred to the departmental social services.

#### **Other crisis**

In Maradi, UNICEF trained 22 social workers (including 7 women) and departmental directors on child protection in emergency and is supporting its government counterpart in identifying vulnerable children in the host and refugees' communities, offering them psychosocial support and/or referring to the adequate structures. The presence of qualified child protection humanitarian organizations is in need in the region to support the social services and set up psychosocial support.

In Agadez, 58 unaccompanied children (including 15 girls) were referred to the child protection services for alternative care and reunification procedures. Most of the children come from the region of Zinder and had moved to Algeria for begging.



## RapidPro

In October 11 out of 51 health centers sent complete reports on nutrition performance. This reduction in the reporting is due to the polio campaign and the lack of the health district supervision on this activity. In WASH, UNICEF received 37 reports out of 249 expected water points reports. The

decrease in the reporting is caused by the absence of the local NGO in charge of coaching and monitoring the community reporting on the water point. Nevertheless 3 alerts were registered in October 2019 and all 3 were resolved. The alerts are discussed during WASH working group meetings, and an updated "alert tracker" is shared with Diffa WASH actors.

## Humanitarian Leadership, Coordination and Strategy

UNICEF leads the Education and WASH Clusters, the Child Protection Sub-Cluster and the Nutrition Technical Working Group in close collaboration with government counterparts. UNICEF technically leads the Rapid Response Mechanism (RRM), implemented jointly by ACF, ACTED, DRC, IRC, OCHA, WFP and the government, and is responsible for the procurement of NFIs. September and cumulative annual RRM achievements are shown in the infographics above.

UNICEF responds to chronic and acute crises in Niger. A 2019 program focus is to operationalize the linkages between humanitarian and development programming (Nexus), particularly in Diffa. UNICEF strengthens national health and nutrition systems to deliver emergencies services, including severe acute malnutrition (SAM) prevention and treatment, measles and polio vaccination and free health care for children under 5. UNICEF prioritizes access to quality school services for children affected by crises and building resilience in schools. Conflict-affected children receive comprehensive child protection services, and cholera prevention and readiness and access to safe water remain as priorities.
