Protect children from violence, abuse and exploitation



Address harmful practices through changing social norms



Accelerate routine birth registration

Strengthening child protection systems to end violence against children



Supporting the government-led child protection case management system



Training social welfare officers to better protect children



Training police, lawyers and judges in child friendly judicial practices



Monitoring and reporting on grave child rights violations



Improving access to birth registration services

What have we accomplished?



Provided family tracing and reunification services for unaccompanied and separated girls and boys registered



85,526 victims of gender-based violence in humanitarian situations supported



7,052,139

births registered



Improved systems to track child protection cases, monitor incidents of grave child rights violations



Promoted political and community engagement to end violence against children and harmful practices (female genital mutilation and child marriage)

What do we need?



Legal age for marriage established at 18



Costed action plans to prevent and respond to violence against children



Improved case management processes to provide alternative care for victims



Access to free and universal birth registration services



Investment in community mechanisms to end violence against children and harmful practices
