

Situation at a Glance**



711,000 children need education in emergency support¹

29,671 schools affected (equivalent to **89%** of total **33,471** schools)²

5,871 classrooms totally damaged and **13,310** classrooms partially damaged³

US\$412.9M (Php 21.3B) needed for school reconstruction and rehabilitation; US\$17.3M (Php 894.7M) needed to replace damaged learning materials⁴



141 water structures and over **410** sanitation facilities have been destroyed⁵

2.4M people need emergency water and sanitation support⁶



High prevalence of global acute malnutrition in the affected regions: **7%** in Region 7; **8.4%** in Region 8; and **8.1%** in CARAGA⁷

At least **133,800** children are at risk of acute malnutrition in the affected population⁸



486 health facilities damaged: **304** in Region 7^{9;} **100** in Region 8¹⁰; and **82** in CARAGA¹¹

SOCIAL POLICY

2M most vulnerable household beneficiaries, including an estimated **3.6M** children of the *Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program* (4Ps) were affected by Typhoon Rai, pushing them deeper into poverty



912,000 children need child protection services¹²

Urgent **MHPSS** (Mental health and psychosocial support) needs for children and caregivers

High risk for all forms of abuse and exploitation including **SEA** (Sexual Exploitation and Abuse)

Overstretched support system for children (social workers, teachers, family members)

UNICEF and Partners Emergency Response*



Students in Hanginan Elementary School, Maasin City received UNICEF school supplies and a temporary learning space in support of their limited in-person learning. Together with partners, UNICEF also installed handwashing facilities and repaired toilets to ensure students stay safe and healthy as they go back to school.

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

- 202,187 people accessing a sufficient quantity of safe water for drinking and domestic needs
- 28,256 people use safe and appropriate sanitation facilities
- 158,040 people reached with hand-washing behaviour change programmes
- 79,227 people reached with hygiene kits including items for the menstrual hygiene management

NUTRITION

- 509 children aged 6 to 59 months with severe acute malnutrition admitted for treatment
- 137,317 children aged 0-59 months screened for wasting
 14 923 primary caregivers of children aged 0-23 months
- 14,923 primary caregivers of children aged 0-23 months reached with infant and young child feeding counselling
- 50,948 children aged 6 to 59 months receiving vitamin A supplementation

HEALTH

- 129,210 children and women accessing primary health care in UNICEF-supported facilities
- 81,588 healthcare workers and communities provided with Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

CHILD PROTECTION, GBVIE AND PSEA

- 18,436 children and parents/caregivers accessing mental health and psychosocial support
- 21,622 people with access to safe channels to report sexual exploitation and abuse

EDUCATION

 49,206 children accessing formal or non-formal education, including early learning

RISK COMMUNICATION & COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- 5,558,350 people reached with messaging on prevention and access to services

Stories from the Field



CHRISTINE MARINO'S FAMILY is among the 25 households that received cash assistance for toilet repair in Barangay Pinut-an, San Ricardo, Southern Leyte. After the damages brought about by Typhoon Odette, they lived in a makeshift shelter while rebuilding their house. A partly open toilet was installed beside it for their daily needs. With the support of the Government of Japan, UNICEF provided their family with cash assistance to build a private toilet and gave water, hygiene and dignity kits to ensure proper hygiene and sanitation practices within their homes. The water system rehabilitation in their barangay also helped the affected families access clean and safe water.

FINANCIAL APPEAL

UNICEF appeals for US\$27.9M to augment the Government's emergency preparedness and response to Typhoon Rai. As of July 9, UNICEF's appeal has raised US\$ 11.89M with a funding gap of 57 per cent.
