711,000 children need education in emergency

29,671 schools affected (equivalent to 89% of total 33,471 schools)2

5,871 classrooms totally damaged and 13,310 classrooms partially damaged³

US\$412.9M (Php 21.3B) needed for school reconstruction and rehabilitation; US\$17.3M (Php 894.7M) needed to replace damaged learning materials4



141 water structures and over 410 sanitation facilities have been destroyed⁵

With support from the Government of New Zealand, UNICEF worked with partners in providing humanitarian cash transfers to households in Bohol under the 4Ps program. This support helps vulnerable children and families recover from the impact of the super typhoon.

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

- 282,701 people accessing a sufficient quantity of safe water for drinking and domestic needs
- 41,220 people use safe and appropriate sanitation facilities
- 235,255 people reached with hand-washing behaviour change programmes
- 123,772 people reached with hygiene kits including items for the menstrual hygiene management

- 880 children aged 6 to 59 months with severe acute malnutrition admitted for treatment
- 179,374 children aged 0-59 months screened for wasting • 19,135 primary caregivers of children aged 0-23 months
- reached with infant and young child feeding counselling **74,482** children aged 6 to 59 months receiving vitamin A supplementation

- 146,663 children and women accessing primary health care in UNICEF-supported facilities
- 82,195 healthcare workers and communities provided with Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

CHILD PROTECTION, GBVIE AND PSEA

- 27,103 children and parents/caregivers accessing mental health and psychosocial support
- 10,267 women, girls and boys accessing GBV risk mitigation, prevention and/or response interventions
- 28,045 people with access to safe channels to report sexual exploitation and abuse

EDUCATION

• 102,795 children accessing formal or non-formal education, including early learning

- 5,548,350 people reached with messaging on prevention and access to services

NOLYN has dedicated her life to helping Badjao children access their $basic\ right\ to\ education-an\ uphill\ battle\ she\ experienced\ first hand\ as$ a Badjao herself. As a fully-licensed teacher, she volunteered to teach and translate lessons to Badjao students at Canlanipa Elementary School and UNICEF child-friendly spaces in Surigao City. With the resumption of in-person classes, Nolyn knows that Badjao students will still face many social and cultural barriers. She remains committed and optimistic about their future. "I don't want them to ever forget being Badjao, but I want them to see a bigger world. Education allows them to live a life they deserve,' she said.
